Remarks on board Monday June 28th 1847

These 24 hours commences with a light breeze from the Southward and pleasant weather heading to the Eastward under all sail at sun set shortened sail Middle and latter part light breeze from S.W. and pleasant heading S.E. under all sail hands employed in ships duty saw nothing So Ends these 24 hours

Lat by Obs 30° 37' N Long 164° 41' East

Remarks on board Tuesday 29th 1847.

These 24 hours commences with a light breeze from the S and Westward and pleasant weather heading to the S and Eastward Middle part calm latter part light breeze from the Westward and pleasant steering to the Eastward, hands employed in ships duty, saw a Fin back So Ends these 24 hours

Lat by Obs 30° 16' N Long 165° 33' East

Remarks on board Wednesday June 30th

These 24 hours commences with a light breeze from the W and pleasant weather heading to the Northward under all sail, Middle part squally from the West heading to the N under short sail latter part squally heading to the S and Eastward, saw a ship steering to the Northward, Main stay parted found it very rotten employed in fitting another stay out of a pair of old Back stays saw Fin backs and Sperm So Ends these 24 hours

Lat by Obs 31° 02' N Long 166° 00' E

Remarks on board Thursday July 1st 1847

These 24 hours com with light breeze and squally from the S.W. heading to the S.E. and Eastward Middle part the same latter part light breeze from the South and pleasant heading to the E, saw Fin backs finished our Main stay and set it up So Ends

Lat by Obs 30° 39' N Long 167° 00' East

Remarks on board Friday July 2^d 1847

These 24 hours com with a light breeze from the S and pleasant saw 2 ships one of the boiling Middle and latter part the same standing on different Tacks So Ends these 24 hours

Lat by Obs 30° 53' N Long 167° 02' East

Remarks on board Saturday July 3^d 1847

These 24 hours com with a light breeze from the S.W. and pleasant at 1 P.M. spoke the ship Rouman of New Bedford 23 1000 Bbls of sperm oil, at 4 P.M. spoke the ship Martha of New port 26 months out 700 Bbls of sperm oil Middle part squally from the S heading to the Eastward latter part fresh gale and squally weather, Laying to under a Close reef Main Top sail saw nothing So Ends these 24 hours

Lat 31° 00' N Long 167° 20' East

Remarks on board Sunday July 4th 1847

These 24 hours com with fresh gale from the S Laying to under a close reef, M. top sail Middle part Moderate gale latter part light breeze from N and pleasant heading to the S under all sail one ship in sight So Ends

Lat by Obs 30° 29' N Long 167° 54' East
