Remarks on board Saturday September 2^d
 Then 24 hours commences with a fresh gale from the
 Southward Laying To under a Close reef Main
 Top sail heaving to the Westward employed in
 stowing down oil at 5 P.M. finished Choked of
 the Fore hold Middle and Latter part fresh breeze
 from the Southward and foggy weather, Laying
 To under a Close reef Main Top sail employed
 in stowing down in between decks So Ends
 Lat 48.38 N Long 150

Remarks on board Sunday Sept 3^d
 Then 24 hours commences with a fresh breeze
 from the S.W. and pleasant, Middle and Latter
 part Light wind and Variables with some fog
 saw 10 ships Chased a whale with out
 Success employed in Ships Duty So Ends

Remarks on board Monday Sept 4th
 Then 24 hours commences with a moderate breeze
 from the Southward with some fog, saw a
 Dead whale sent a boat to him Proved not to be
 good Middle and Latter part fresh breeze from
 the Northward, spoke the Bark Ann of
 Sag Harbour 24 months out 1000 Bbls of
 whale oil, Spoke the Ship Bowditch of
 Warren Lacking one whale of being full
 He had on board the Captain of the Ship
 David Padock* of Antwerp the Ship David
 Padock struck a rock coming through the Straits
 and stove Her, employed in sitting up Stocks
 So Ends Lat 48.26 N

* David Padock (Starbuck) Lost in the Parnass Straits with a full cargo

in the Ochotsk Sea in Sept 1848

Remarks on board Tuesday Sept 5th
 Then 24 hours commences with a fresh breeze from
 the Northward and Cloudy weather Middle and Latter
 part more Moderate, Chased whales with out Success
 employed in Ships Duty 4 ships in sight So Ends
 Lat 47.52 N Long

Remarks on board Wednesday Sept 6th
 Then 24 hours commences with a moderate breeze
 from the N.E. and pleasant, Chased a whale
 in Company with the Bark Ann of Sag Harbour
 but with out Success, at 5 P.M. she went on board
 of the Bark Ann, to exchange Light Schoops
 for Heavy Schoops, exchanged about 300 weight
 Middle and Latter part fresh breeze from the N.E.
 and Cloudy weather, Lowered the boats 3 times for
 whales but with out Success, 6 Ships in sight
 So Ends Lat 47.50 N Long 150.24

Remarks on board Thursday Sept 7th
 Then 24 hours commences with a moderate breeze
 from the N.E. and Cloudy weather, Chased whales
 with out Success Middle and Latter part Moderate
 breeze from the Southward and foggy weather
 under short sail So Ends

Remarks on board Friday Sept 8th
 Then 24 hours commences with a fresh breeze from the
 S.W. with rain spoke French Bark Salamander
 11 months out 350 Bbls Middle and Latter part
 fresh breeze from the Westward Laying To under
 short sail four ships in sight So Ends
 Lat 37.59 N Long 150.28
