from the N & heading E & E middle part moderate
latter part calms with rain the sch Alfred
in sight employed in ship duty
Lat 31.25 long 170.41

Remarks Sunday Feb 25th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds from the
West heading to the North middle and latter part
the same the sch Alfred in sight
Lat 30.45 long 170.21

Remarks Monday Feb 26th 1849

these 24 hours commences with moderate winds from
the West heading E & E middle light winds and
thick weather latter part the same at 7 A.M. lat
the schooner Alfred half of the whale 16 lbs to Ench
employed in ship duty Lat 30.56 long 170.40

Remarks Tuesday Feb 27th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds from the
West steering E & E and thick weather middle and latter
part the same the schooner Alfred in sight
saw black fish to Ench with rain Lat 31.02 long 171.40

Remarks Wednesday Feb 28th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds from the West
heading to the E & E middle part strong winds and squalls
from the South heading E & E latter part the same
the schooner Alfred in sight to Ench employed
in ship duty Lat 31.29 long 171.59

Remarks Thursday March 1st 1849

these 24 hours commences with strong winds from the
South heading E & E middle part calms latter part
light winds from the West steering E & E the schooner
Alfred in sight to Ench employed in ship duty
Lat 32.35 long 172.50

Remarks Friday March 2nd 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds and
pleasant from the West steering E & E at 5 P.M. spoke
the ship Fox of New Bedford Capt Adams 46 month
out 1600 whale 400 sperm middle part the same latter part
calms the schooner Alfred in sight to Ench
employed in ship duty
Lat 32.57 long 173.39

Saturday March 3rd 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds from the E & E
steering E & E middle part the same latter winds from
the South and pleasant weather ship Fox and schooner
Alfred in sight saw a Bark steering E & E to Ench
hands employed in ship duty Lat 32.50 long 174.50

Remarks Sunday March 4th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds from the South
middle part calms latter part light winds from the
West steering E & E the schooner Alfred in sight
to Ench with pleasant weather Lat 32.31 long 174.50

Remarks Monday March 5th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds from the East and
pleasant steering E & E middle part the same latter part gale
winds from the S.W. at 10 A.M. spoke the ship Harriet of
New Bedford Capt Shearman 46 month out 1800 whale 200 sperm
the schooner Alfred in sight to Ench employed in ship duty
Lat 32.08 long 175.00

Remarks Tuesday March 6th 1849

these 24 hours commences with fresh winds from the S.W.
and pleasant the Capt on board the ship Harriet at 2 P.M.
spoke the ship Harriet and schooner Alfred in sight to Ench
employed in ship duty Lat 32.08 long 175.00

Remarks Wednesday March 7th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds and pleasant
weather from the S.W. middle and latter part the same
ship Harriet and schooner Alfred in sight employed
in sailing to Ench Lat 31.49 long 175.00

Remarks Thursday March 8th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds and pleasant
weather from the South heading to the East middle
part the same at 5 P.M. lat the ship Harriet have
the head ail 12 lbs from her share of the whale latter
part winds from the S.E. heading E & E to Ench
employed in sailing schooner Alfred in sight
Lat 31.41 long 175.00

Remarks Friday March 9th 1849

these 24 hours commences with light winds and pleasant weather from
the South steering to the East at 5 P.M. lat the schooner
Alfred have 18 lbs of oil for her share at 6 P.M. finish
sailing to Ench with pleasant weather hands employed
in gunnery duty Lat 31.18 long 176.40
