

Bound out to Wading island

April Saturday the 15th sea and W. 42
First frost 5 p.m. fresh gale from North
East & rough, considerably frost and the climate
changed at 11, the tide seemed to run
to the pier towards very strong and a number of
early beggars out, very cold, very wind from N
E. W. 42. most of the birds so early today
all hands employed in ships ship, 1850

April Sunday The 16th second 1849
Light breeze from the N E kept fresh.
This day we had a heavy rain. Several
hundred of the Indians were at the river
the day before, but when they found at 6 AM. that
a bark was being lowered out the passage, they who
were from the N. E. to the ship, saw the bark
of the Indians, & set fire to it, and striking it so
early the day.

April Monday The 17th Dec 1842
Fresh gale from the S.W. at 6 1/2 P.M.
saw the island of Coast Range bearing
North East 15 miles, which kept the ship
at 8 o'clock sent the ship at 10th at 11 o'clock saw
the island of Muzquiman bearing N.W. East 15
miles at 12, 22 12. sent the ship off for the Coast Range

April Tuesday The 18th sea cool & dry
First found this 24 hours fresh Cales from S.W.
Last call & heavy rain. A gale blew in
the Port End of Maryquarry & kept ship in
harbour. WIND at 22.046 st. Sea not ascertained
No winds the felow & his wife employed in ship & family

April Wednesday The 19th sea and
All this day light winds & buffeting from
West. & at East 2 or 3 miles at 8 P.M. fell a squall
of rain & rain from 1st to 4th poured hard, & ends
this day Lat at 12 23.13. N. Lon 118.01 W. &c.

April Thursday the 19th we saw a set of 1819
Light breezes from the S W. smooth sea
and a dog at 1 P.M. saw a seal to the west
ward at 6 P.M. took in sail at 6 P.M. and
Blaze Fish several I got 3 & lost 2 more
lost them along side & cut them up & kept
the ship off N.W. at 2.30 P.M. 1819

East of Mullings island, one Degree

Friday April the 22^d sea and 1849
Fine clear weather Light breezes from
the Westward & very squally at dark took
up 2 squalls & more the heading to the N. E. 1/2 E.
at 12 took a heavy squall of rain & wind
from the S. W. set at air 12 23 154 Sun 13.30

April Saturday the 22d. sea accd 1849
Sailed past this place 24 hours before we got from N M
at 2 P M took by wind from N E for Deptford ship
off at 10 AM on 10 AM saw Whiting's island bearing S W
at 10 miles ran down the shore till 12 so entered the
bay and our Black fish were gone L Burrell
April Sunday the 23d. sea accd 1849

Birds began flying to N.E. at 4 P.M. and 8 o'clock
on the South West side of Matthews island, at
least 4 Capt. Eyer, went on shore. At 4 P.M. Starbuck
back went on shore and came off at 12 noon

Monday the 24th Dec 1849.
Fresh gales from the North East, drawing
rather on shore, at 1 P.M. harboured watch went for
store at 6 came off, with 3 men - missing Ma
Kerwash, Frederic Long, & the Carpenter. Harnon
at 6 A.M. got underway & run on the North side
side, the island, fasted the affair & lost the anchor
& 10 came to an anchor on the N.W. side & com-
menced taking in sweet potatoes 400 pounds Potatoes
600 pounds Potatoes at 12 A.M. had 4800 pounds
sweet Potatoes. & sent 100 day, all well &c

April Tuesday the 25th HK sea west 1849
Fresh gales from N.E. at 2 P.M. took 800 lbs
m^o shore potatoes at 6 P.M. got y^e riper again
to go & get the sheaves up at 10 locked shop &
stood back again, being too rough at 10 came
to an end, & started the breeze again & at 2
P.M. got it up again & went to the south part
the island &c.

Mednes day. The 26th day sep a Oct 1848.
Fresh gales, viz the N E at 3 sazes. The two gu
ates Babel & Brier to find the anchor, it being too
rough gave it up to day & left Captain Dyer on
shore to get the rigging to find in night. Next
day my uncle the mate went out to find in
the Breeze at 3 Bell stood out the Southward of the island
at 11 Bell were ship & stood in the N E & found at 8 o'clock saw
the land again & were ship & stood to the west. 10 o'clock
