

Feb 15th Commenced with A. Strong Breeze
Sun of wind from the W. Steering N. E.
the Harbour watch knitting yarn
P.M. Got A. Distance 4 Degrees to
the Distance Eastward of Cape Horn
2 men down with the Cadys. Given
so ends these 24 hours with Clear

Feb 16th Commenced with light winds A.
offed M. we made spun yarn. P.M. Baidy
In making A. mizen topgallant
sail. And so ends with A. little squall

Feb 17th Commenced with A. fair wind And
steering N. N. West. A.M. made spun
yarn P.M. Came up A. little squall
we reefed the fore And mizen topsail
in Course one hour we turned the
reefs out And made sail with
standing sails. so ends this 24

Feb 18th Begins with light winds But. Ahead
Friday P.M. washing their mizen topgallant sail
likewise plenty of birds and fish to be
seen All round the ship so it is all
the time with us. At night very squally
And rainy they called all hands to
take in sail. so ends Clear. 1831. 1831

Feb 19th Begins with squally weather and
heavy winds. the Harbour watch
called all hands out to take in more
sail. so ends with more bad weather

Feb 20th Commenced with fine and pleasant
Sunday weather all of the day. A.M. made sail
by setting standing sails steering N. and
by West. Latitude by Observation 49.12

Feb 21st Begins with light winds. And clear weather
P.M. Sending up the main topmast
standing sails. And poor Jack down with
the Cadys. Given. And Captain Fisher.
Give him A. blanket. And an old pair
of trousers that's the first time this
voyage. Latitude 43.25 N. so ends this
24 hours with Calm weather. 1831. 24

Feb 22nd Commenced with having All hands
Sun on deck mending the old sails. the
captain turning Bone Belaying him
Do. And light winds. At sun set rigged in
standing sails And boom. 11 o'clock.
Praced up the yards sharp in the
other track so ends these 24 hours 1831
Midnight the Harbour watch in de
we rigged in the 2nd boom. 1831. 1831
