

81 Remarks on Sunday December 28th 1845
 these 24 hours begins with light winds & calm & fine weather all hands
 employed in cutting on the whale at 8 PM got the head off & the franklin
 took it & was cut in the body at 11 PM let the water & commenced
 clearing up decks & getting ready for boiling latter part of the day light
 breeze & fine weather at 6 AM made sail & commenced boiling head
 the franklin boiling saw several seals all hands employed in cutting at
 junk & boiling & C to crew this day
 Lat in by 17.48 & long in by Chronometer 35.55 West

82 Remarks on Monday December 29th 1845
 these 24 hours begins with light winds & fine weather all hands employd
 in cutting junk & boiling head the franklin boiling saw several seals
 at 1 PM was ship to the N.E. at 2 PM finished cutting junk &
 washed off at sun down capt. Griffin & Capt. Baker came on
 board after their letters & went back again & Mr. Hopkins came
 on board & got his letter written by the wind to the N.E. mile &
 latter part of the day light winds & fine weather all hands employd on
 board in cutting blubber & boiling saw several seals at 6 AM was ship
 to the N.W. at 7 AM made sail the day ends fine weather
 Lat in by 17.54 & long in by Chronometer 36.33 West

83 Remarks on Tuesday December 30th 1845
 these 24 hours begins with light winds & fine weather all hands employd
 in boiling & cutting blubber at 1 PM took ship to the N.E. the
 franklin to windward boiling at sun down motioned seal made
 & latter part of the day light winds & fine weather all hands employd
 on board in boiling cutting blubber & washing oil & at 2 AM was ship
 to the N.W. the day ends light winds & fine weather
 Lat in by 17.55 & long in by Chronometer 36.47 West

84 Remarks on Wednesday December 31st 1845
 these 24 hours begins with light winds & fine weather steering by the wind
 to the N.W. under double reefed sails all hands employd in cutting
 blubber & boiling several seals in light at 3 PM got all the blubber
 cut & the franklin. After we capt. Hazard came on board at 5 AM went
 back at sun down was ship to the N.E. at 6 AM made sail &
 latter part of the day fine weather at 6 AM was ship to the N.W. at
 & made sail at midnight finished boiling & all hands employd in
 moving down the back to crew this day
 Lat in by 17.52 & long in by Chronometer 38.58 West

85 Remarks on Thursday January 1st 1846
 these 24 hours begins with fine weather & moderate breeze steering by the wind
 to the N.W. all hands employd in moving down oil at 6 PM the franklin
 spoke us at sun down motioned sail & took ship to the N.E. & took
 3 watches through the night at 3 AM was ship latter part of the day
 moderate breeze at 5 AM made sail & commenced moving down oil
 at 11 AM was gave the franklin her part of the oil which was 11 casks
 the day ends moderate steering on the N.E. by the wind
 Lat in by 17.41 & long in by Chronometer 37.00 West

86 Remarks on Friday January 2nd 1846
 these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from E. N.E. under all sail
 steering by the wind beating up coast & at 2 PM all hands employd in
 moving off the back at 5 PM finished moving & washed off decks
 made & latter part of the day fine breeze & passing clouds & lightning at 6
 AM called all hands & commenced going off the back at 8 AM finished & commenced
 grinding specks & other various kinds of work on board saw two seals
 at midnight on track ship to the N.E. by the wind to crew this day
 Lat in by 18.20 & long in by Chronometer 38.50 West

87 Remarks on Saturday January 3rd 1846
 these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from East & passing clouds
 under all sail steering by the wind beating N.E. watch employd in lat's
 duty grinding specks & other various kinds of work on board one seal
 in light saw one whole tongue steering to the N.W. at 4 PM took
 ship to the N.E. & at sun down reefed topsails & took ship to the N.E.
 mile & latter part of the day equally by shells at 3 AM made sail
 several seals in light saw the D franklin watch employd in washing
 there ends the day ends light winds & fine weather
 Lat in by 17.11 & long in by Chronometer 36.29 West

88 Remarks on Sunday January 4th 1846
 these 24 hours begins with moderate winds from East & fine weather under
 all sail steering N.E. by the wind watch employd in washing there
 down the D franklin off our lee bow & one sail off our lee beam at 3 PM
 hauled at 4 PM at sun down took in topsails & reefed topsails at 10 PM
 took ship to the N.E. mile & latter part of the day fresh breeze & passing
 clouds & equally at 5 AM made sail saw several seals at 9 AM took
 ship to the N.W. the day ends with a fine breeze & passing clouds
 Lat in by 17.35 & long in by Chronometer 38.18 West
