 These 24 hours begins with light winds from N.E. & fine weather. Steady by the wind backing at 10 A.M. & after the watch employed in pumping the main topsail. Middle & latter part of the day light winds from E. & E. to N.E. Steady by the wind at 4 P.M. saw 1 large whale at 10 lowerd for him & struck one to the Mainboard boat & killed him on board in sight to the leeward of Morrison. got the whole fluked along side & commenced getting ready for cutting so much this day fine weather
 Lat in by 11.29 South Long in by Chronometer 35.10 West

137 Remarks on Sunday February 22nd 1846
 These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze & fine weather at 4 past 1 P.M. hooked on to the whale & commenced cutting at 4 past 8 P.M. got the head off & body in & let the watch Middle & latter part of the day light winds & fine weather at 5 A.M. called all hands & hooked on to the head & cut it off at Morrison got through cutting all on board made fair & Steady by the wind backing at 10 A.M.
 Lat in by 11.34 South Long in by Chronometer 35.22 West

138 Remarks on Monday February 23rd 1846
 These 24 hours begins with light breeze from N.E. & fine weather. Steady by the wind to the N.E. by all hands employed in getting ready for boiling & cutting up junk at 2 P.M. made a fire & commenced boiling. Steady & cutting junk saw one strong sail at 6 P.M. hooked on to & was ship to the Eastward & let the watch some squally hawking round & light winds latter part of the day squally & rainy attended with thunder & lightning & the winds variable from N. to E. & N.E. at 9 A.M. on board the main sail & strucked it for the try works & main hatches to keep the rain off & commenced boiling again squally & rainy by 11 A.M. the day once thick weather no observation to day

139 Remarks on Tuesday February 24th 1846
 These 24 hours begins with thick weather & squally & rainy by 11 A.M. Steady by the wind backing from E. & E. to N.E. the wind from N.E. to the North all hands employed in cutting the whale & boiling under double reef topsails Middle & latter part of the day strong breeze from the North & ruggid sea on all hands employed in boiling at 8 A.M. took down our awning & reefed the try sail & last reefed the fore topsail all hands employed in taking care of the oil the day once ruggid weather & cloudy
 Lat in by 11.28 South Long in by Chronometer 34.06 West

140 Remarks on Wednesday February 25th 1846
 These 24 hours begins with strong breeze from the North & ruggid weather & cloudy Steady by the wind to the E. & E. all hands employed in boiling out blubber & cutting it up & taking care of the oil the blubber is blasted & makes black oil at 9 P.M. finished boiling & turned up the oil of latter part of the day some moderate breeze & more smooth at 5 A.M. let the fish at 7 called all hands & let single reef topsails & washed off the decks & brook out the leeward side of the hole forward & finished first method to show down our oil the day once with a fine breeze from N.E. & cloudy & smooth weather
 Lat in by 11.16 South Long in by Chronometer 34.52 West

141 Remarks on Thursday February 26th 1846
 These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from N.E. & cloudy & smooth weather. Steady by the wind to the Eastward all hands employed in Steady down out at 1 P.M. down left of work & let the watch Middle & latter part of the day light winds & fine weather all hands employed in Steady down out at 8 A.M. took the ship to the Eastward & made all sail but the main sail the day once light winds from N.E. Lat in by 11.27 South Long in by Chronometer 31.52 West

142 Remarks on Friday February 27th 1846
 These 24 hours begins with light winds from N.E. & fine weather. Steady by the wind to the N.E. by backing from N.E. to N. by all hands employed in Steady down our oil at 3 P.M. finished Steady off & washed off the vessel inside & let the main sail & let it Middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze & fine weather. Steady by the wind backing up from N.E. to N. & E. watch employed in ship duty fitting the craft for whaling & boiling over our oil we finished out the hole saw one large whale Steady to the N. by the day once fine weather nothing in sight
 Lat in by 13.10 South Long in by Chronometer 32.20 West

143 Remarks on Saturday February 28th 1846
 These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from N.E. & fine weather. Steady by the wind backing at 10 A.M. watch employed in fitting whale craft & grinding blades & other various kinds of work on board at 7 P.M. the wind backed East Steady at 10 A.M. Middle & latter part of the day fine breeze & fine weather watch employed in washing the deck at 7 A.M. Steady at 10 A.M. the day once with a fine breeze from N.E. & fine weather
