these 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & fine pleasant weather during which all hands employed in ship's duty washing the brig off out side & other various kinds of work on board
middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze & fine weather watch employed in ship's duty finished washing the brig off out side saw one sail steering to the N. & the day ends with light winds
Left in by log 11.53 & long in by Chronometer 57.22 West

164 Remarks on Saturday March 21st 1846
these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from ESE & fine weather during which all hands employed in ship's duty saw one strange sail
middle & latter part of the day light breeze & fine weather watch employed in washing there close the day ends with light winds
Left in by log 15.18 & long in by Chronometer 58.20 West

165 Remarks on Sunday March 22nd 1846
these 24 hours begins with light winds from ESE & fine weather during which all hands employed in washing & burning there close
middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze & fine weather during which all hands employed in moderate breeze from ESE & fine weather
A plenty of whale bird
Left in by log 15.51 & long in by Chronometer 60.00 West

166 Remarks on Monday March 23rd 1846
these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze & fine weather during which all hands employed in washing & burning there close
middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze from ESE & fine weather during which all hands employed in washing & burning there close
Left in by log 15.34 & long in by Chronometer 61.15 West

167 Remarks on Tuesday March 24th 1846
these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from the NNE & some squally under all sail steering through the passage between the islands of Dominica & Guadeloupe bound in the fine Thetis bay after wood & water at 5 PM sent our chains at sun down the boats started home & the fine Thetis bay south side of the course & took in the port outside & stood back & forth under the lee of the island at 5 PM made sail & stood in for the land at 10 PM came to anchor in fine Thetis bay the barque barclay lay there 140 boats were sent on shore with a raft of cork to end this day

168 Remarks on Wednesday March 25th 1846
these 24 hours begins laying to anchor in fine Thetis bay in company with the barque barclay all hands employed in getting of water & cleaning the barboard side of the brig at 1 PM hoisted in a raft of water 40 lbs
latter part of the day laying to anchor the barboard watch went on liberty & the barboard watch employed in painting the barboard side of the brig some heavy showers of rain by 1 PM to end this day

169 Remarks on Thursday March 26th 1846
these 24 hours begins laying to anchor in company with the barclay one watch employed in painting the barboard side of the brig & the other watch on liberty at sun down the watch came on board & were left off painting latter part of the day fresh tracks & spring clowes the barboard watch employed in painting & the barboard watch on liberty at 7 PM the barclay went to sea at 11 PM finished painting the barboard side & hoisted the barboard side out & began the clean of the lines to end this day laying to anchor

170 Remarks on Friday March 27th 1846
these 24 hours begins with fresh tracks & spring clowes laying to anchor the barboard watch employed in painting & cleaning the barboard side of the brig & the barboard watch on shore at 3 PM the brig hoisted of Dolly's came in to anchor left Corbett 7 months out 1000 lbs at sun down the barboard watch came on board middle & latter part of the day fresh tracks the barboard watch employed in painting the barboard side of the brig & the other watch on shore the day ends the same

171 Remarks on Saturday March 28th 1846
these 24 hours begins with fresh tracks laying to anchor in company with the barclay painting one watch on shore at 5 PM finished painting the barboard side at sun down the barclay came on board middle & latter part of the day during by 1 PM all hands employed in getting off wood & water from the bar & moving & below the day ends laying to anchor Left in by log 15.35 & long in by Chronometer 61.35 West

172 Remarks on Sunday March 29th 1846
these 24 hours begins with spring showers of rain by 1 PM laying to anchor in company with the barclay all hands employed in moving down wood & water at 5 PM got through moving off middle & latter part of the day fine breeze & fine weather the barboard watch on liberty on shore the day ends fine weather laying to anchor
