

173 Remarks on Monday March 30th 1845

These 24 hours begins with fine weather lying to anchor in fine
reports being in company with the Lionides the Westward watch on shore
on liberty at sun down they came on board & the Lionides men got to
fighting on board & sent for Capt. Cornell middle & latter part of
the day fine weather all hands employed in painting the Stern & other
various kinds of work on board & looking off & on from the shore to see the day

174 Remarks on Tuesday March 31st 1845

These 24 hours begins with fine weather lying to anchor in company
with the brig Lionides all hands employed in getting off potatoes from
the shore at 11 PM got all on board middle & latter part of the day
fine breeze & fine weather at 4 PM & at 5 we took our anchor & stood
to sea bound to St. Eustacia & left the Lionides lying to anchor
the day ends with a fine breeze

Sat in by log 15.45 ex long in by Chronometer 61.47 West

175 Remarks on Wednesday April 1st 1845

These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze & passing along under
all sail steering with the bound to St. Eustacia watch employed in ship
duty at 2 PM stood to sea with the middle & latter part of the day fine breeze
& passing along the day ends the same steering down for St. Eustacia

176 Remarks on Thursday April 2nd 1845

These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze & passing along steering in for
St. Eustacia harbor at 1 PM came to anchor & fired 2 shots one
American Schooner lying to anchor belonging to South Carolina
was sent on shore & got off 1000 lbs of goods middle & latter part of the
day fine breeze & fine weather at 6 PM we took our anchor & stood
to sea bound to St. Thomas after one man the day ends fine weather
Sat in by log 17.39 ex long in by Chronometer 63.25 West

177 Remarks on Friday April 3rd 1845

These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze & fine weather under all sail
steering with the bound to St. Thomas middle & latter part of the day
light breeze & fine weather several days in sight at 11 PM we went on
shore to St. Thomas after a man the day ends lying off & on at St.
Thomas the wind on shore from N.W.

178 Remarks on Saturday April 4th 1845

These 24 hours begins with light breeze from S.W. lying off at St. Thomas
lost on shore at 8 PM & 5 PM came on board with 2 of us in ship & then
by the storm of William Maury was made all sail & beat out the bay
with the wind from S.W. middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze
from the S.W. & fine weather under all sail beating to windward watch
employed in washing there close to once this day

Sat in by log 17.58 ex long in by Chronometer 65.05 West

179 Remarks on Sunday April 5th 1845

These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from S.W. & fine weather
under all sail steering by the wind to the S.W. the beating to windward
one brig off our lee quarter steering the same watch employed in washing
there close at 11 PM the wind shifted to the North & at 12 PM stood
N.W. & at sun down shifted sail & sun under easy sail fresh breeze
at 5 PM made sail & stood in for the land saw several sails saw
the Schooners shot at 10 PM we went on board of the brig the barque
& were beached. Steered by the wind to the Eastward beating up to the shore
to end this day

180 Remarks on Monday April 6th 1845

These 24 hours begins with moderate winds from S.W. the steering by
the wind to the Eastward gaming with the barque at sun down
came on board & refilled the sails blowing strong & ragged steering by the
wind to the S.W. the beating up to the shore middle & latter part of the
day fresh winds beating up to the shore shot at 10 PM refilled the sails
the day ends strong winds 3 miles from the shore to end this day

181 Remarks on Tuesday April 7th 1845

These 24 hours begins with strong winds lying off at the shore at 1 PM
we went in shore & went on board the brig the schooner of crew beached & got
his letter the had 13 lbs of oil the brig Lionides lay then working
at 4 PM we came on board & shifted sail & spoke the barque & saw
white matter & run off for it but saw nothing more at sun down were
ship & steered by the wind to the Eastward under double reef to sea
for sail & May sail & top sail middle part of the day fresh breeze
latter part moderate at 6 PM made sail & stood off down the island
to the westward in company with the barque watch employed in ship duty
at up the fore topmast & top gallant back stays the day ends moderate & fine
weather
