here 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from the N.E. & fair weather steering to the South by the wine water employed in brining the cod fish at 3 PM more by calm at 8 PM finished it at low down shortened sail & went ship & headed up East Middle & latter part of the day moderate breeze from the South & fine weather at 8 at low down sail & steered by the wine brading from S.E. to E. & water employed in ships duty saw one sail steering to the N.W. & the day was fine weather. Left on by day 20.15 at long in by Chronom 470.31 West

 the wind & took the boats up on the upper main it lasted for one

these 24 hours begins with strong breeze from W.S.W. & very good sea
& clear weather warm but not hot during eve at 11 M. & 12 M. the first point
double reefed & masted the mast heads at 4 P.M. have two lights at ten
down took in the fore top sail at 10 P.M. & at 8 P.M. lower top &

216 Remarks on Sunday May 12th 1848

These 24 hours begin with fresh breeze from the E. W. & blowing strong & sunny. Sea on starting by the wind to the E. & E. & water, m'ply, in ships sails at 8 P.M. caught one fishes at sun down between boat & mistle & latter part of the day light wind & variable at 8 P.M. breeze all but E. & stand by the wind backing from E. to West by the wind from the E. to the water, m'ply, in morning the E. for boat at midnoon the wind backed to the E. & light breeze & fine weather stand till 4 P.M.

Set in by 31.52 or less in by 66.00 or less

217. *Uromastix* on Wednesday May 13th 1848

On 21st Nov. again with light wind from the N.E. & fine pleasant weather. Having both the water and bog in burning the old fore soil at 4 PM calm & smooth sea at low down station. Soil at 1 PM having been covered up from the N.E. Wind N.W. & at 5 PM back soil water imphy. in burning the fore soil at 7 PM. Both the low pressure & birds fine weather & moderate breeze at Division. Stood at M.C. once this day.

Set in by 30.40 at Long in 9 Chronometer 77.45

21st Remarks on Thursday May 14th 1846

these 24 hours begins with "Macrotis" arrives from the E & E & fine (1892) weather. Having a lot of water impeded in passing, the forecast at 2 PM stands correct. At 4 PM wind shifts & at 8 AM birds are coming in like a lot of low flying swallows & sparrows going north at 8 AM & 8 PM. I covered the boats & got over to the landward boat at 9 PM got the usual flock of long neck & short neck birds flying East & the wind from NE Amble & latter part of the day strong winds & very rough sea on at 7 PM we hooked on to the water & cut him in & let the forecast & then by the wind under short sail, backing up & heaving in all hands making in cutting up the blizzard the day into rough weather.

Set in by 31.19 at top in by Chronometer 77.50 West

219 Remarks on Friday May 15th 1846

there 24 hours before with strong winds from the N.E. & passing clouds
& it rained here on reaching to the S.W. corner. So I sent all hands
employed in cutting up blubber at 2 P.M. get it all cut up & put it
in pots & cook & left the men on deck & bring the rug to move it saw
several vessels coming to the N.W. & middle & latter part of the day strong
winds from N.E. & it rained here on at 5 & 6 P.M. much of fire &
consumed boiling beef all hands employed during the time
the day ended was good weather.
