

204 Remarks on Saturday July 18th 1848
these 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from E & ESE & fair weather
all sail during the winter to the SE watch employed in ships duty
splitting out observations at 5 PM struck & passed & left him
at sun down shortened sail latter part of the day squally & rainy
falls at 8 at 10 made sail at 4 Tacks ship to the north &
picked up at 6 a yellow cask at midday on track ship to the SE
so in the day left in by 34.05 at long in by 110.25 West

205 Remarks on Sunday July 19th 1848
these 24 hours begins with squally weather & rainy by falls then
by the wind to the SE at sun down shortened sail latter part of the
day light winds & calm at 2 AM were ship to the SE & at 8 made
sail saw one whale big at 7 picked up & small log the day in
nearly calm left in by 33.35 at long in by 110.18 West

206 Remarks on Monday July 20th 1848
these 24 hours begins nearly calm & pleasant weather one
in sight at 3 PM calm at sun down shortened sail made & latter
part of the day calm at 5 at 10 lowered after black fish got none
one whale big in sight at 6 the boat came on board at 9 at 10
at light were sprung up from the south made sail & stand ESE
watch employed in fishing at 11 PM the day in with light
winds & fine pleasant & smooth weather
left in by 33.35 at long in by 110.15 West

207 Remarks on Tuesday July 21st 1848
these 24 hours begins with light winds from the SE & fine pleasant weather
during ESE watch employed in fishing at 11 PM the day in with light
winds & fine pleasant & smooth weather
at 5 PM saw a large sail finished the yard & set up the rigging
at sun down shortened sail calm weather & at 10 made sail
part of the day calm latter part light winds & wind & calm at 8 PM
light breeze from the SE made sail & then to the SE one whale
big in sight watch employed in ships duty at 9 PM ESE & SE
saw grampusses the day in nearly calm
left in by 33.39 at long in by 110.00 West

208 Remarks on Wednesday July 22nd 1848
these 24 hours begins with light winds from the SE & fine pleasant
weather during ESE watch employed in ships duty about the bowsprit
rigging one whale big in sight at 3 PM the went out light at sun
down shortened sail & stand ESE SE made & latter part of the day
light winds from the SE & fine pleasant weather at 8 at 10 made all
sail during ESE & SE watch employed in ships duty saw plenty of
porpoises the day in light winds & fine weather
left in by 34.17 at long in by 117.20 West

209 Remarks on Thursday July 23rd 1848
these 24 hours begins with light winds from the SE & fine pleasant
weather during ESE & SE watch employed in ships duty about the rigging
at sun shortened sail made & latter part of the day light winds from
the Eastward & calm by 10 at 11 made all sail & then for
black fish at 11 am on board got none teeth ship & black even
at 10 saw saw at 11 many big watch employed in backing out after
bore at 11 we saw the many big boats off after whales at
midday saw the whales to in the day during for them
left in by 34.23 at long in by 118.13 West

210 Remarks on Friday July 24th 1848
these 24 hours begins with light winds from the Eastward & fine pleasant
weather whales in sight at 8 many boats after them at 11 PM
we lowered for them & the many boats had finished the whales
at 2 PM we came on board at 4 we lowered again & got part to
an 80 bl whale to the Starboard boat & lost the line & then got dry
& part of the line in to the boat & lowered again & lost it for good
& the whale went off to the windward at 9 PM we got on board &
at the watch & shortened sail light winds & fine smooth weather
made & latter part of the day light winds from the south & fine weather
at 5 at 10 made all sail at 6 Tacks ship & lowered ESE saw one whale
off our beam at 10 went out light we took up one cask of oil that
had leaked out & put the oil in an other one the day in light winds
& pleasant weather stand ESE & SE by 110.10 West
left in by 34.11 at long in by 118.00 West
