

291 Remarks on Saturday July 28th 1845
these 24 hours begins with light breeze from the south & fine weather
smooth sea during the day with employ in breaking out the after
after butter & molasses at 2 PM then with the at sun down the
leat & then by the wind to the westward made & latter part of the
day light breeze & fine weather at 8 PM made all sail but
the biggs whalemen at 8 were saw two whole & 3 miles off our
weather beam Tacked ship for them at 9 saw them again the big
gem of Provincetown struck a whale & jellyed the rest & they
went of the windward the day ends beating the windward
Left in 5 04 34.20 at long in by Chronometer 15.07 West

292 Remarks on Sunday July 28th 1845
these 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from N.W. & fine weather
whole in light to westward & going to windward at 1 PM were
lowered for them but saw nothing more of them at 5 came on board
at 7 I went on board of the big gem of Provincetown cast net, and
cutting a whole 3 minutes out at 8.00 & one whole & long side
at 9 came on board & then to the N.E. under double reef topsails
at 1 PM the wind bell to the westward then N.W. & south
at 8 PM made all sail & then by the wind saw the big gem &
one branch cut ship at 8 PM were picked up 150 gallons each
of sperm oil with only 2 bags on each side hoisted on one side
at 9 the day ends with a fresh breeze from N.W. & some heavy
squalls round Tacks ship to the N.W. by the wind
Left in 5 04 34.00 at long in by Chronometer 15.25 West

293 Remarks on Monday July 27th 1845
these 24 hours begins with a fresh breeze from N.W. & some heavy
squalls of wind & rain during by the wind to the N.W. at sun
down double reefed the topsails & Tacked ship & head up the at 5 PM
made all sail & Tacked ship to the north the big gem near to us and
put our oil down in the grooves for each 150 gallons made it to
& put one up between the quarter & bridge deck at 9 began to squall &
rain took in the yellow paint at 10 Tacked ship to the N.W. being the day
ends more fair weather
Left in 5 04 34.00 at long in by Chronometer 15.21 West

294 Remarks on Tuesday July 28th 1845
these 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from N.W. & cloudy weather
under all sail during by the wind bearing & the big gem off our lee
beam during to the N.W. bearing at 4 past 6 PM saw 3 breaches off our
lee quarter 4 miles off at sun down Tacked sail made & latter part
of the day light breeze from N.W. & calm at day light saw 3 whole
off our lee bow going about N.W. by the wind made all sail at 7 lowered for them
it being calm & whole running could not get at good chance to fasten
the Harbord boat got at slightly even in one place & held on 5
minutes & came out & the whole went off to windward back to
the day ends light breeze & fine weather beats off after whole
Left in 5 04 34.10 at long in by the same 15.15 West

295 Remarks on Wednesday July 29th 1845
these 24 hours begins with light breeze from N.W. & fine weather
during to the N.W. by the wind beats off after whole at 2 past 2 PM
came on board & then N.W. by the wind the whole went back to out
light we run the Harbord boats line over the stern & got the log out
at sun down Tacked sail & Tacked ship to the N.W. at 7 calm
made & latter part of the day calm weather & very hot water
employ in ships duty about the rigging water employ in making
a kegg bag saw supposed & grasshoppers the day ends calm
Left in 5 04 34.15 at long in by Chronometer 15.07 West

296 Remarks on Thursday July 30th 1845
these 24 hours begins with calm weather & pleasant & very warm
watch employ in ships duty about the rigging but the foremast
water making a kegg bag for the line at 7 PM at light breeze
sprung up from the N.W. then made equally & rain through
the night latter part of the day light breeze from the south & fine
weather at 5 PM made sail at 8 then N.W. watch employ
in ships duty at 10 PM finished the kegg bag & took it
75 fathoms under water & broke the Harbord to pieces
saw grasshoppers the day ends light breeze & fine pleasant
weather Left in 5 04 34.24 at long in by Chronometer 15.30
