

Wednesday Sept 5 1849
 first part Employed Boiling
 at 6 AM Saw a sperm whale
 and 2 boats at 7 Quake the
 whale to the ship found him
 to be a whale that was struck
 by the Starboard boat it being 32
 days since the whale was first
 struck & latter part Employed
 Boiling Lat 31° 54' N 169° 30' E

Thursday Sept 6 1849
 at 1 hauled on to the whale
 at 3 1/2 PM finished and began
 to bail wind from East
 blowing again latter part
 strong gales Employed bailing
 Lat 31° 44' N 169° 00' E

Friday Sept 7 1849
 first part strong breezes and
 rainy weather latter part
 more moderate at 9 1/2 AM saw
 sperm whales Lat 31° 32' N

Saturday Sept 8 1849
 first part strong breezes with
 squalls of rain 3 boats in chase
 of the whale at 6 the Starboard
 boat lowered and struck and killed
 one small and latter part light
 breezes and cloudy weather at 5 1/2 AM
 began cut at 6 saw more sperm
 whales and lowered but got nothing
 all hands Employed in getting ready
 to bail Lat 31° 12' N
 Long 169° 12' E

Sunday Sept 9 1849
 first part moderate breezes and
 fine weather all hands Employed
 in cleaning away and getting ready
 to bail so ends the day

Monday Sept 10 1849
 through the day Employed Boiling
 weather cloudy Lat 31° 00' N 168° 12' E

Tuesday Sept 11 1849
 first part Employed Boiling
 latter part Employed Stowing
 down oil in the fore peak
 weather un pleasant Lat 29° 45'

Wednesday Sept 12 1849
 through the day Employed Stowing
 down oil strong winds from
 ESE ship heading North
 Lat 30° 42' N

Thursday Sept 13 1849
 all the 24 hours Employed Stowing
 wind from ESE Lat 31° 19' N

Friday Sept 14 1849
 through the day strong gales
 Employed Stowing down oil
 Lat 30° 40' N

Saturday Sept 15 1849
 through the day strong winds
 finished Stowing oil 2 men
 sick of off duty
 Lat 31° 01' N
 Long 167° 40' E
