that it will be a disappointment to all who
is Condemned in the wellpane of the
voyage but I must be so on here before
my time comes. Latter part fine weather
but no whales. Lat 2° 44' S Long 173° 04' E

Saturday Feb 2 1850
Through the day moderate weather
Lat 2° 42' S Long 172° 50' E

Sunday Feb 3 1850
Through the day fine weather
No signs of whales Lat 2° 44' S.

Monday Feb 4 1850
Through the day fine weather and
No whales at 8 pm Spence Sch
Alford of New Bedford leaves port
Master 50 man and out 1800 Spence
at Lat 2° 50' S Long 173° 04' E

Tuesday Feb 5 1850
Through the day fine weather at 8 am
Saw ship Gen Scott to the seaward
at 5 pm all 3 of the above vessels
in company Lat 3° 6' S Long 173° 05' E

Wednesday Feb 6 1850
first part light winds and fine weather
at 5 pm Spence ship of Scott latter
part at 8 am saw Spence whales
Sounded for them Struck and kill
1. Small Lat 3° 24' S



Thursday Feb 7 1850
first part Baits in chase of the whales
at 4 the L.B. of the J Scott Struck and
brought the line at 5 the L.B. of the Milton
Struck and killed a small one and at 6
took the whale to ship made all fast for
the night. Through the night heavy squalls
latter part cut in the whales and made
tail Lat 3° 21' S Long 173° 32' E

Friday Feb 8 1850
Through the day Employed boiling weather
fine Lat 2° 43' S Long 173° 30' E

Saturday Feb 9 1850
first part moderate winds and fine
weather ship heading to the south.
No signs of whales ship of Scott
in sight Lat 2° 54' S Long 173° 24' E

Sunday Feb 10 1850
all the 24 hours moderate weather
Lat 3° 20' S Long 173° 25' E

Monday Feb 11 1850
Through the day Squally with rain
Lat 3° 30' S

Tuesday Feb 12 1850
all the day rainy and my self sick
both in body and mind and of a voyage
that has been a voyage of troubles to my wife
Sandra and I long to see the end of it before
I die Lat 3° 35' S Long 173° 40' E

Wednesday Feb 13 1850
Through the day moderate weather and no whales
Lat 3° 40' S Lat 2° 50' 172° 50' E
