

Friday March 29th 1861
This day A gale from S. with heavy
squalls of rain & hail. Let go second anchor.
Benken W. Morton departed

Saturday March 30th
This day fresh S. winds & stormy weather.
R. W. Morton returned

(88) Leave Port Sunday March 31
At 6 A.M. called all hands to heave in
Chain. When William Angles, Thos. H. Johnson,
W. H. Wright, boatsteved refused to do duty, also
M. V. B. Howell, Depla Steven, Benken W. Morton,
Charles Dodman, Francis Granger, Joseph Fuller,
John Censerbeck, and George W. Tidy refused to do duty,
but ~~threw~~ in brass, at 2 P.M. got under weigh,
and went to sea, heavy brags from N.E.W.

Monday April 1st
At sunset double reefed the top sails took in jibs
at 10 heavy gale from N. bore her to under fore & main
spinnaker & fore jib. M. Staydell, heavy squalls of hail,
then returned to duty, land in sight Lat 47° 25'
Long 168° 12' J. dark, dark, times, the voyage looks dark
to us, all hands disappointed low spirits.

Tuesday April 2nd
This day heavy brags from N.W. to S.W. & squally &
rainy ship on different tasks, under short sail, broke out
shop chest, horrid weather, & hard times.

Wednesday April 3rd
This day A gale from N.W. with heavy squalls of hail
lost Bow boat at 8 A.M. more ship heading N.W.
Ends more moderate Lat 47° 58' S. Long 168° 4' E.

Thursday April 4th
First part of this day strong S.W. wind, ship on
different tasks at 9 A.M. saw the snare reef.
Latter part more moderate.

Friday April 5th
First part of this day A gale from N.W.
Ship on S. task at 2 P.M. took in N. top sail
A heavy ugly sea ship laboring heavy & shipping
some heavy sea. Steward fell down the cabin stairs
with A tub of boiling water, scalded his body, face &
hurt his head. A short time after com spitting blood
tried to bleed him in the arm, but could get no blood
from him. I think he is consumptive. Cook & Steward
both sick, now nothing to eat, at 4 P.M. heavy
rain, wind hauled S.W. Hard times, three, six days
from port and A gale of wind all the time got east
of A lat. Made it 48° 20' S. Long 167, East

Saturday April 6th
This day strong S.W. wind & stormy, at 7 A.M.
saw the snare bearing N.W. by N. dist 10 miles
at 9 passed the snare, steering S.W.

Sunday April 7th
This day A gale from N.W. & stormy laying to on
S. task at 10 A.M. more ship. At 5 P.M. more
again to the Westward, unfull, unfull, weather.

Monday April 8th
This day moderate S.W. winds steering N.W. by N.
Lat 47° 20' S. Long 164° 10' East

Tuesday April 9th
Solander.
First part of this day moderate S.W. winds, middle
& latter part wind hauled N.W. at 11 A.M. Solander
Island bore E. S. E. dist 10 miles, at sunset shortened
sail. So Ends
