

Terre Del Fuage

Nov 19th

Thursday weighed anchor and stood out by the Island for St. John's under light and rain squalls from the South West. Friday more wind and squally afternoon landed very rough on one rock and took St. Pierre's stone and returned on board. one was washed off the rock but was saved all night.

Nov 20th

Friday. midnight wind hauled S East in squalls kept off and ran westerward. Passed Capstan rocks early morning. very foggy. 9 o'clock of Phillips rocks. Plenty seals up. But fled from the boat as soon as schooner bore in sight. very wild could not land for the mountainous sea. kept on and reached L'Anse au Loup at 3 o'clock afternoon a water covered looking country. This as we sail westward but this is an unexpected Harbour. good as a mill pond & plenty wood and water. we called by found in all the Fugion Harbour we have visited. This has been the first opportunity of getting westward since leaving Linnox Island on the outer sea coast. Sailed down our skin and prepared for the day. Ends cold wind southerly with snow squalls.

Nov 21th

Saturday cut wood and filled water this day which comes in moderate and continues pleasant throughout. got about five barrels mussels at low water. see no other and but few geese. No Indians here.

Fouquier's Rocks

Sunday morning at 3 o'clock weighed anchor and passed out through adventure pass. working westward no seals on Sillbank or Nicolson rocks. saw plenty in the water of Cape Castelnau. heaving in shore wind north and Pleasant. afternoon landed on a rock of L'Anse au Loup. full of seals but proved to be hair. worked up to the East. found and pulled in few seals on the rock but put off as soon as we approached with the boats. shot some and returned on board.

West Coast of Terre Del Fuage

Nov 23

Monday. rain all night with wind light morning. had rain. Some Rock women on sea and over Island to winnowed wind freshening up. worked up to Cape New Blomberg to head to land ran under the lee of the Island and came to anchor 16 fathoms water & sandy bottom. one boat went in to search the beach found no seals. But brought off nine geese and some Celery found a lot of tend. poles indicating an encampment last season. This is the Pleasant Island to look upon since leaving home. not to begin and clothes with verdure from Base to summit. good wooding & watering. and smooth roadstead on a sandy bottom. a nice retreat during, westerly and southwesterly gales for vessels bound westward. Day ends clear. Wind fresh S West.

Nov Island

Nov 24th

Tuesday morning wind hauled north East. got underway and ran around to the Cape. Landed two boats and pulled in saw good many signs where no clasp matches landed and shot. Sevin found two unoccupied camps in good order with shells stored. Brought on board 6 skins. and ran for Some Rocks. wind fresh N. East. found one rock covered with seals and but one passage up. as they were pushing down. I ordered the boat ahead two or three. fired two shots into the mass and jumped onto the rock and turned them back. called second officer in. 688 seals and we two shot 82 seals as we from them south in falling from the ledge. Skinned and rafted them off all safely making 88 seal this day. wind freshening from the Eastward. kept off and ran westward sun down.

Nov Rocks

Nov 25th

Wednesday morning wind dies out. off Cape Gloucester. Eruption Island. afternoon blows up heavy and stormy. Ran into Eastern Harbour and came to anchor 16 fathoms water. 9 am blowing strong W N West. turning in.
