First part Moderate Weather some little rain
Winds from Westward, Middle as above.

Latter Strong breezes from the Southward
Course N.N.W.

Thursday 8th

Strong breezes and fine Weather throughout
these 24 hours. winds S.W. Course N.N.W.

Lat by Obs 43. 43 S.

Friday 9th

Commences with fine Pleasant Weather winds
from S.W. Course N by E. People Employed
lashing the Spare spars into the side.

Middle and Latter part Moderate and
fine Weather

Lat. by Obs 42. 03 S.

Saturday 10th

Fine pleasant Weather throughout these
24 hours Steering N.E. by S. winds from the
Southward and Westward. People employed
Painting and fitting the Boats Myself all day
on deck Employed making a boiler strainer and
fitting Whaling Gier.

Lat. by Obs 40. 59 S.

Sunday 11th

Fine pleasant Weather throughout these
24 winds from the Southward and Westward
Course N.E. by N.

Lat by Obs 39. 35 S.

Remarks on board the Ship Mobile
Commenced 15th August 1837. one year
out with 360 Barrells.

Latitude at noon 6. 23 S.

Longitude at 4 P.M. 85. 26 W.

Wednesday 16th

First part of this day moderate
Weather. Middle part Strong breezes at 2 o'clock
took in the light sails. at sun set single
Reefed the Fore topsail and hauled up the
Main sail seen a number of Finbacks this day

Latitude at noon 6. 11 S

Thursday 17th

Longitude — 84. 11 W.

This day Commences with Strong breezes and
Cloudy Weather at 10 o'clock shifted our Course
for Selango for wood and Water at noon
saw a Barque hup to windward of us
hoisted Spanish colours standing to the
Westward, in the afternoon broke out in
the Fore hold for a cask of Shook heads
mark'd J.L. and put down 13 barrells of
Blackfish oil in the Fore hold seen Finbacks
and a vast quantity of Porpoises this day

Latitude at noon 5. 31 S.

Longitude 83. 8 W.
