Monday
the 12th Day
This Day Commenced with gentle gales from
S.E. & came by the watch below in
the forenoon and all hands employed in
the afternoon having made four breast mats
saw a ship off the lee bow about 6 miles off
So ends this Day Latitude 15.11 S

Tuesday
the 13th Day
This Day Commenced with gentle gales from
the N.E. came by the watch below and the
rest employed in mending sails all hands in
the afternoon Nothing seen from the west
So ends this Day Latitude 13.4 S

Wednesday
the 14th Day
This Day Commenced with gentle gales from
the N.E. came by the watch below and the rest
employed in mending sails all hands
employed in the afternoon Nothing seen
from the west So ends this Day Latitude
11.18 S

Thursday
the 15th Day
This Day Commenced with gentle gales E.S.
Steady Breeze haul & tack 1 watch below and the
rest employed in ship's duty saw a sail off the
lee bearing standing to the west the greater
part of the day thick rainy weather So ends this Day
Latitude 9.35 S

Friday
the 16th Day
This Day Commenced with Rainy squally
weather from N.W. South and from
South to N. Watch below and the rest employ
in catching water So ends this Day No Latitude

Saturday
the 17th Day
This Day Commenced with variable winds and
squalls of rain 1 watch below and the rest
employed in ship's duty at 3 pm saw a sail
about 12 miles off So ends this Day Latitude 8.5

Sunday
the 18th Day
This Day Commenced with thick squally weather
and heavy showers of rain continued so all day
Wind very variable saw a very singular bird
off bow with a long bill and long neck and
very long legs his body was white and of a
pale red color when the green legs he bit upon

Sunday
the 18th Day
When the yard and in the boat but he was very
shy Nothing more remarkable this Day So
ends Latitude 8.30 S

Monday
the 19th Day
This Day Commenced with light puffin winds
broke up the bear haul and got up bread
1 watch below and the rest employed in ship's
duty Captain out well So ends this Day Latitude
8.42 S

Tuesday
the 20th Day
This Day Commenced with gentle breezes and
puffin one watch below and the rest employed
in breaking out potatoes and picking over
3 ships in sight and 1 brig at 6 pm started to
dash off water into the belt So ends this Day Latitude
8.38 S

Wednesday
the 21st Day
This Day Commenced with thick squally rainy
weather 1 watch below and the rest upon deck
Nothing in sight Wind very variable at
6 pm saw a school of porpoises So ends this
Day Latitude 7.39 S

Thursday
the 22nd Day
This Day Commenced with gentle breezes from
the S.W. Steady Breeze haul with Starboard Dacks
about 1 watch below and the rest employed in
ship's duty at 4 pm saw a sail astern as far
as the eye could discern off Dirk Lee was 5 miles
off the weather quarter of schooner rig So ends
this Day Latitude 6.55 S Continues gentle gale

Friday
the 23rd Day
This Day Commenced with light winds from calm
1 watch below and the rest employed at 9 am
spoke the Superior off New York Cape & Don't
he came on board and spent the day he
pass round to the Portland Harbors sealing
pass of schooner about 20 tons 21 men on board
So ends this Day with gales both sides

Saturday
the 24th Day
This Day Commenced with fine weather and gentle gale
from N.E. saw a ship off the lee beam the Capt. he
on board the Superior and the White Comet here
about spent the day one watch below and the rest
employed in ship's duty So ends this Day with
fine weather Latitude 6.38 S
