

Being Sunday we are not allowed to land our oil
until to Morrow, plenty of Apples and Grapes on
shore and Chestnuts and green Apples and Lemmons.
No port Charges for us to pay on account of land-
ing oil, which is much better than to lay off and
on, there has been this season 35,75 bbls of Apples
and Grapes there this season, there is being here
3 or 4 Merchant vessels and one whaling brig belonging
to the Council. At 6 P.M. Sat Sat anchor watches, officers
Monday Nov 2^d Wood watch, At 10 looks the wind from
SE and blows strong, Draped down to the bluff and
brought up, at 12 P.M. the topsails and got ready to
take the anchor, At 12 P.M. from the anchor, there in
the Chace and Sat Sail, and worked up to the Harbor
Tide about 3 fathoms of Chace with the anchor, Carpenter
at Quark and very trouble some about the Ship.
Monday Nov 2^d

Commenced with strong wind from E
blowing up to the Harbor, under reefed topsails
At 8 P.M. close in I went ashore, sent off a lighted
and took the oil on shore and left it in charge of
the Sabany, he sends it home for \$2.50 per bbl
Clear of all other Charges, No port Charges, At 8 P.M.
I came on board with 2 Portuguese, I took to sea
with me, At 6 P.M. started off SE W under all
Sail, Carpenter Drunk and Saucy to me and
the officers, put Irons on him and put him in
the little house and locked him up for the night.

Tuesday Nov 3^d

Commenced with the wind from WSW
and much rainy weather, sent out to the W of the 33 banks
through the night, At 4 in the morning tacked and stood
to the SE Clear of Ice, Saw a 3 masted schooner steering
to the SE, A brig cross our bow, steering in to Sagat
heading SE through the day, heavy weather, At 6 P.M. wind
blew to the SE, Clear SE W, under all sail, In the morning

Unbent the Chace and Shave them Chace, At 8 A.M.
Carpenter Promised to behave him self, took the Irons off
him, he went to his duty, Called all hands about to give
them good advice, kept Charles young on Deck all day, for
Cheery Saucy and Mutinous.

Sat by 37, 25 Long by 25, 00
Wednesday Nov 4th

Light wind from E and Fair weather to
SE and E by S, All sail set, Saw nothing throughout
the day, Steered SE W, Watches employed on the rigging,
Cooper making buckets, Carpenter picking Cattle to the
house, Black Smith employed in making Irons for
Mens Anchors, So ends this day with pleasant weather
and chiding fair for a calm then a SE wind.

Sat by 33, 11 Long by 27, 53
Thursday Nov 5th

Fresh breeze from SE and Cloud with rain
Heading to the SE and SE by E, All sail set, Saw a
Schooner, At 10 P.M. sent up last night, and a Clipper Bark
Merchantman passed close by us to day, Saw a Schooner
going to the SE fast, Sat a Tent at the main top gallant
mast head and better through to it, Watches employed on
the rigging, At 6 P.M. tacked heading NW W At 8 P.M. tacked
heading SE.

Friday Nov 6th

Commenced with fresh breeze from W
and a Rain Storm, Heading SE W At 8 A.M. saw a
Schooner on the weather quarter, locked ship, Saw no
more of it, Tacked heading SE W by S, Latter part of
the day Clear up and fair, away Calm, In the fore
noon Saw 2 Sail Standing to the SE W, Watches employed
in ships duty, Charles young employed yet in
showering the windlass whellers.
