

Saturday 3 June 1843

WB 150

Begins a light breeze from S. N. and fine weather a number of Whales in sight Lawrence and Chisell at 4 P.M. got a Whyle at 1 it soon died at 6 spoke the Gallo Gallo hall got a 40 lb specimen Whale since we have her at dark shortened sail at daylight thick and foggy made sail at 9 A.M. struck and killed 10 ends the day calm. Boats towing the Whale to the ship Lot 55.00

Sunday 4 June 1843

Begins calm and some fog Boats towing at 5 got the Whale broken at 8 began to cut at 10 finished middle part employed in chopping away the head at 3 P.M. began to back latter part the same. So ends fine weather saw Whales to windward to far to down to sails in sight Lot 54.00

Monday 5 June 1843

Begins a fine breeze from S. and showers employment in boiling kettles in sight at 4 saw a Whale going quick to windward did not succeed at the time saw the Gallo take a whale along side at dark took in sail spoke ships Ballena Head of Providence 1800 lbs 3 Whales this season the Chilton 1000 the Superior New London at daylight made sail at 5 A.M. lowered for a Whale but could not strike a number of Whales in sight ships all in. Chisell saw the Superior take a Whale also the Chilton So ends the day employed in boiling 7 ships in sight 18 Boiling and 8 cutting our Boats in Charge of Whales

Tuesday June 6th 1843

Begins a fine breeze from the W. and pleasant weather employed in boiling 7 ships in sight at 2 P.M. lowered for Whales but could not strike at 3 saw a ship take a Whale along side at dark took in sail from the night latter part a fine breeze and overcast saw a number of Whales going quick to windward lowered some without success So ends the day employment in boiling and towing down 1.00 in sight No Obs 100

Wednesday June 7 1843

Begins a fresh breeze from the N. E. and S. E. and rain employment in boiling and towing 5 ships in sight at 6 P.M. finished boiling lowered down 100 lbs. Blowing on fresh took in sail middle and latter parts a heavy gale from S. E. etc ends the day ships towing to the tender. Close reefed sail plenty of rain

Thursday June 8th 1843

Begins a gale from S. E. and plenty of rain ship towing to the tender at 1 P.M. sail chided part set the fore sail lot part more moderate set double reef 5 sails and finished towing down Chock of the main hatchway So ends the day plenty of rain at 11 in sight and 1 ship chasing a Whale Lot 55.36

Friday June 9 1843

Begins a fresh breeze from S. and cloudy ships under single reef 5 sails at 4 P.M. spoke the Bingham at 750 lbs middle part log to the W. S. W. the latter part thick and rainy ship towing to the S. E. So ends the day 1 ship in sight No Obs
