

100 Friday July 14th 1843

J.L.B. Begins with a very light breeze from the Wnd and some fog employed in boiling and stowing down oil plenty of Whales in sight h. Bonds in choice but could not strike at 5 P.M. lowered and struck a Whale killed him and he sunk very heavy having 4 Boats fast & getting the other 2 too. Boats crews in to the Fast Boats hauled him up at dusk Got him to the ship & bled middle part Boiling at 7 A.M. began to cut at dusk finished so ends the day employed in Boiling No Obs. Foggy 150 lbs

Saturday July 15th 1843

Begins with a light breeze from S.W. & foggy ship lying to the Wnd under short sail employed in Boiling and stowing down oil. Middle part Boiling and plenty of Fog & Rain latter part blowed on strong with plenty of Rain close reefed S. sail and took in S. sail so ends Watch employed in Boiling No Obs.

Sunday July 16th 1843

S.B. 150 Begins with a fresh breeze from S.E. with Fog & Rain ship lying to the Wnd under S. sail employed in Boiling at 5 P.M. started 3 backs of Boiled into Boys at dusk weather more favorable set S. sail. Saw a sail to the East latter part a fine breeze from S.W. employed in Boiling & setting up Pipes lowered struck and killed a Whale so ends plenty of Whales in sight. The Milton Cutting No Obs.

Monday July 17th 1843

Begins light air and pleasant weather the Boats towing the Whale at 5 P.M. Got him Called Cut in heart Throat and Lips & dashed down from the S. sight Middle part Calm employed in Boiling and Clearing away the Head at 7 A.M. began to cut again at 10 finished & went to breaking out the after Haul so ends employed in Boiling a strong breeze from the E. with fog & Rain the Milton in sight No Obs.

Tuesday July 18th 1843

Begins with a fresh breeze from S.E. with Fog & Rain ship lying to the Wnd under short sail employed in Boiling and stowing down oil. Middle part plenty of Rain latter part a strong breeze from S.E. and squally made no sail employed in Boiling and stowing down spoke the Factor Houlton of Fairbanks & Whales this season so ends Lot 59.54. & Long 148.37.45

Wednesday July 19th 1843

Begins with a strong breeze from S.E. & squally ship lying to the Wnd under close reefed S. sail and S. sail all hands employed in stowing down & Boiling at 4 P.M. Commenced stowing between decks for the first time Middle part a Gale employed in Boiling latter part much the same Boiling and stowing down 3 sails in sight No Obs.

Thursday July 20th 1843

Begins with a fresh breeze from S.E. and with Rain made no sail all hands employed in Boiling & stowing down at 4 P.M. passed a ship with a ^{Whale} ~~Whale~~ along side Saw 2 Whales during the after noon Middle part Boiling latter part finished boiling so ends fine weather employed in stowing down Saw 2 Whales going quick did not lower Lot 59.

Friday July 21st 1843

Begins a fine breeze & pleasant weather employed in stowing down at 5 P.M. spoke the ^{Whale} ~~Whale~~ Lee Clifford of Newport 3 Bakers out 600 Apron and 8 Whales this season at 8 took in sail Middle part plenty of rain latter part a fresh breeze from S.E. and squally with rain employed in stowing down at 10 A.M. lowered for a Whale but could not strike so ends 4 sails in sight & cutting close

Saturday July 22nd 1843

B.L.B. Begins with a fresh breeze from S.E. and squally with rain employed in stowing down at 5 finished at 6 P.M. lowered and struck a Whale to the L.B. iron drew of the W.B. struck him killed & sunk him near on board and took in sail at daylight fine weather made the sail at 6 A.M. saw the America of Stonington take 3 sperm Whales lowered for them and before we got there they took 2 sperm Whales & went out of sight at 10 saw another school so ends Lot 58.16. & Long 142.37.45
