

Ship Montpelier Ensign on the North Coast 1846.

July 25th to August 1st
saw quite a lot of Whales going quick to the Westward
parted to one Whale and the fine pointed

Lat 51.22. N Long 149.12. West

August 5th

saw a number of Whales passed and killed
at 8 P.M. took the Whale along side

Lat 50.47. N. 15.05. West

August 15th

saw 4 Whales passed to both Whales killed and
rank and one saved from the other the last Whale
we saw on the coast

Ship Montpelier on New Zealand 1846

Sunday November 1st

got one Whale Lat by 43.27 S Long by 172.0 W

from November 15 to January 1. Continued
gale of wind and rain and light rain in the time
but many fine Whales

January 4th 1847

saw several Whales got one entire the throat
and 2 before the wind blowing on to a moderate
gale gave up cutting in the light pointed
& Churn and lost the Whale saw nothing more

Lat by 46.57 S Long by 144.16 West

Friday April 12th 1847

saw 3 or 4 Whales got one Lat by 42.25 S
Long by 160.35 West 55 fathoms Water

Ship Montpelier Ensign on the Main Bank

April 20th 1847

got one Whale Lat by 40.24 S
Long by 58.16 West 60 fathoms Water

April 30th 1847

saw a school of Sperm Whales and got 2 Whales
Lat by 41.08 S Long by 157.20 West

(Voyage ended July 29 1847)
