

Ship Napoleon Pacific Ocean James A. Brewell master.

Sunday Sept. 13<sup>th</sup> 1858

Christ part Strogo winds from the E. & E. S.,  
 heading N. E. under Reefed Top Sails. Doctor  
 in sight. at 6 P. M. tacked to the Southward.  
 furled the Main Sail. Some part pleasant  
 breezes from S. E. heading S. W. Saw One Min. Back.  
 Lat 55 S Long 150 W

Washington Sept. 14. 1864

(Best - part pleasant Bruises from the S & E  
 heading S. W. all sail set. at 6 P. M. took  
 in 1000 Gallons of Salt. O dear! I wish I  
 was at home; This is a horrid life to live.  
 All one thing; Sundays, as well as week days.  
 I think sometimes I shall have to seek home  
 before the voyage is ended, if I ever see my  
 friends again. I hope God will preserve my  
 health to finish the voyage. But my complaints  
 grow worse every season. Could I be at home  
 now, where I could get medical help, it might  
 preserve me for years. Or ~~would~~ keep off the  
 rapid approach of some fatal disease.

Wednesday Sept. 15<sup>th</sup>

First part pleasant & breezes from the  
S.E. heading E.S.E. at 6 P.M. put a new  
boat on the beam trawl. latter part fresh  
& breezes. at 5 1/2 A.M. tacked to the southward,  
and the ship Ansel Litch. Sat 4-51 Long Is. Is.

Wednesday Sept 16<sup>th</sup>

First part fresh & breezes from the S. E.  
 heading S. to. Saw one Chin. Duck.  
 at 6 P. M. tacked to the N. E. Latter part  
 fine. Saw the Ansel Gibbs whaling

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Thursday Sept 12<sup>th</sup> 1857

First part pleasant & breezy from the E. & the Anse  
bids to theeward whaling. and we are running for  
her. at 1:30 P.M. raised two large whales coming  
quick to the windward, we did not lower the  
boats. (This is too bad: It is four months since  
we saw whales. And then, as now they were going  
to quick to lower for, I want to go home and give  
it up. Latter part fine sea Ship Hector and  
One other & back. Lat 44 Long 144

Prison Sept 18th

First part Pleasant breezes from the S E,  
becoming N E by E. Latter part fine. Started  
water 5 parts a 1/2. Hop. Saltant & Back Star, spoke  
Ship Doctor, and made Capt. Chase made because  
Capt. H would not go on board. Lat 49 Longitude 57

Saturday Sept-17<sup>th</sup>

Wine - part fresh Bruges from E. I. Chearing  
to the Southward. Spiced Back May. Salt  
plants of Sulphur & Boloms. - 1 -  
Latter part fresh Bruges. at 2 H. M. tucked  
to the N. E. Salt St Long 105-22

Sunday Sept. 20<sup>th</sup>

Went - part - Strong breezes from the S.E.  
heading N.E. by E. Saw Sulphur Bottom  
Latter part - strong winds. at 5 1/2 A.M. we  
ship to the southward. Saw 30 fish: and a  
ship. Putting a whale. Supposed to be the Hector.  
Lat 4-00 Long 105-02

Monday Sept. 15 181

First part strong wind from E & E heading  
to the Southward, Saw 2 or 3 Backs.  
 Latter part Moderate Breezes, at 6 A.M. tacked  
to the N.N.E. Saw a Ship to the Southward,  
Lat 6-23 Long 105-50
