These 24 hours commences with fine P.H. Breezes. Middle Calm. Latter a light North Wind heading to the Westward.

Lon By Chron 63° 07' West.

Lat By Obs 52° 30' S

Sunday the 4th March

Commences fine N.W. winds middle by Latter a gail heading to the Westward. Saw much Gulls water very Green.

No Obs. Sun Obscured

Monday the 5th March

These 24 hours first more moderate N.W. wind more to the Eastward Middle Calm Latter commenced blowing from the North again. Clear East. & Fog

Tuesday the 6th March

This day commences with a gail from North Middle a calm latter also. Saw much clp. & B. many birds. Ends

Lat By Obs 51° 52' South

Wednesday the 7th March

First light from the South to East to N.W. at 12 Monideon took to the N.W. wind N.W. at 2 P.M. Exchanged Signals with an American. Danque at 4 P.M. Hoist the Ship's Pretakom of Bristol No. 72 says set Bound to the Pacific Ocean. Lon By Obs 63° 25' W

Lat By Obs 51° 30' S

Thursday the 8th March

Wind from N. to N.W. with a bad sea. Saw a Ship heading Southward. Lat 49° 54' South

Sunday the 14th March 1835

These 24 hours commences with fine weather. Broak out & load 101 lbs Oil in the bottom. Latter middle wind hauled to the N.E. with the main again.

14 Saw a very bright stich Ends this time

Monday the 15th March

These 24 hours commences with squalls from the E.N.E. with thunder, lightning & rain at 12 more deon. wind hauled to the N.W. more ship caught two porpoises. a bad smell from N.E. water quite Green. Ends this day.

Tuesday the 16th March

This day commences more moderate middle and latter parts calm. with a bad smell from the N.E. a plenty of tide rips. Saw killing porpoises. Ends this day. met bold.

Wednesday the 17th March

These 24 hours calm. with the wind all round the compass. 2 or three times with thick fog. & clear and overcast. Saw many porpoises at sunset a large sperm whale one half mile from the ship going to the N.W. a little more daylight but that could not be a bad smell from the N.E. Lon By Chronometer At 8 P.M. 54° 06' 45' West.

Lat By Obs 40° 12' South

Thursday the 18th March

These 24 hours commences with fresh E.N.E. winds lead to the N.W. at 2 P.M. more to the N.E. at 10 P.M. the wind shifted to the West kept off at N.E. Bay Co with a bad N.E. smell. Got the pinesail saw porpoises. Good fine place for sperm whales if good weather.
