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Monday 8th It is now four o'clock. Nothing of interest has occurred during the day. At the dinner there was some small in rain from the north. From the deck this afternoon some of the men caught two shipwrecks and the rest is now drying them. We are all well. Evening E.T.C.

Tuesday 9th It is stormy weather. Last night we had a very severe storm with thunder. I never heard it rain harder it has been storming all day with very little wind. Our sail in night from the north. At noon two of the men in the forenoon, yesterday and one struck the other with their health knife and cut his hand. This afternoon came a large school of porpoise and killed them with great success. Have finished the chlorine and made a balsamic. Still.

Wednesday 10th This morning we passed another thought to have a quarant. My boat, content and which have a heavy squall of rain with considerable wind. The rain squalls have continued through the day, but have not been much to speak of in evening, and have not been observation for the day. This afternoon had a calm breeze. We did not see any more of the porpoise. Quite badly.

Thursday 11th The weather is still the same but the afternoon has been better. I have been at work on my dress. The porpoise is troubled with fishy heat.

Friday 12th The wind strong this morning but cleared about noon so that we put our clothes out and they are now nearly dry. I have finished the dress. Saturday 13th There is now rain in sight at a distance.

Sunday 14th Another week is almost gone and still we are not at the line. We are having a very long passage. This morning I moved and finished my letter. This afternoon have been driving out the. Sunday 15th Just come from the headland and report seven sails in sight. And came on board today. The sailors caught some.

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we put him in a cage a little while, but as he would not eat anything we had to give him some. He has been very sick the time brought on deck today. for the first time for several days.

Monday 16th Another Sabbath is nearly past and we are still in both latitude. The weather is unobscured with light winds and breeze almost directly ahead. There is no sail in sight from the deck, seen from the headland. The porpoise and Greg are both troubled with fishy heat. It makes Lucille very cross and troublesome. Looking over the stern of the boat this afternoon, we saw a Dolphin and a small shark.

Tuesday 17th Have had a fair wind for a few hours. I have commenced a third. George has been making a boat. Saturday 24th Several days just setting up the rigging. This afternoon had a heavy squall of rain, but it is now clear. There are eleven sails in sight from the headland. Have finished letters to Aunt Sarah and Aunt Mary and commenced one to Cousin Abby.

Wednesday 18th We have had another squall day. It has rained very hard a part of the time. There is five sails in sight from the deck, all going the same way we are. I have had a sore throat since yesterday afternoon. It is quite painful.

Thursday 19th The weather is good with a light breeze. My throat is better just before last night we exchanged signals with a Brig the Appleton, bound for Rio. The new yacht was at the line so we could not put others on board. I have finished my letter to Abby. Written one to Mrs. Mayhew, and am now going to write to Cousin Abby. I have written to Mr. Hedrick and one to Father and Abby.

Friday 20th Have been working this afternoon finished my third that I commenced last Monday. Have commenced
