Sat 29th Our Beckham and Canary came this morn
Beckham is very well, if we can come
him shall be much pleased with him
The canoe is pretty but has not yet
This afternoon Mrs Rockiger and Davis
and myself went to Malden. to
take tea with Lady Ross, Emma &
Ethelie went in the morning, Lu and
Capt Davis came up almost there
and came down with us.

Sunday 30th This morn Capt Davis and family Capt
Smith, Ethelie and I went to the Puritan
Chapel. Mr Cotton preached from Phillips words
May 4th 1841. This eve felt too tired to go out,
Monday

This morn Mr Cross invited us to go
to the Beacon, and sent his carriage for
us. The morn was spent in packing a
box to send to Capt Lett Smith, Smith
D Sam, and writing letters, at twelve went
to the Beacon, Lunched at 1/2 past one and
returned about 1/2 past 4. Had a pleasant
visit, this eve had calls from Walter
Mills & wife and Mrs Pele, Mrs Cole and
her daughter Maggie called while we
were out. Tomorrow if the weather is good
my shall go into the country.

Tues 1st This morn had a call from Mr Jamieson, to invite
us to take tea and pass the eve at his
house on Tuesday. Did not go to the country
today as Mrs Davis was not able to go
had an attack of diarrhoea. This morn I
attended a fair of white goods for Geo. this
afternoon have been stitching on my machine
for Mrs Carroll. This eve shall stitch for Mrs
Davis.

Wednes 8th This morn started for the country had gone
but a very short distance when the horse
refused to draw, and finally turned around
we got out as quickly as possible, except
to be turned over, and could not get

into the carriage again I was dreadfully
frightened. This eve Capt & Mrs Davis, Mrs Carroll
and I went to the Chapel. heard Mr Jamieson

Thurs 5th Morn. was introduced to Mrs & Miss Jamieson
and we went to Mr Jamieson's, and
passed a very pleasant eve, partly packed
was there, and appeared very much amused
with my singing, we remained until about
eleven, the Jamiesons arrived while we
were there and on our return found an
letter from Berkeley, informing us of
Uncle Charles. Watt, and that his son Charles
had been appointed to his place in the
Quebec House. This morn at 1/2 past 8
we started for the country. Went up on
Ladder Hill side. passed the residence of the
Governor and Judge, and called at Sam
Locke, the residence of the American Consul.
Mr Linnam was not at home but sent
word to his housekeeper to give us whatever
we wished for. she had cakes of two kinds
and wine, Rum, and Lemon Syrup. The ship
Spangled Banner was flying from the flag
staff at his gate, and I passed. The
song by that name, on his piano, and
sang it. also American, from there we
went to Thet's Gate, where a dinner that
we desired was in readiness for us.
Capt Davis, wife, and children, Capt Smith, Ethelie
and myself comprised the company, after dinner
drove to Longwood, then to Sealwood,
then turned our faces homeward, called
at Mr Mc Donalds country seat, only his
housekeeper was there. Mrs Mc Donald and
children started for Scotland by the Rust
Steamer. Mrs Mc Donald had ordered his
housekeeper to entertain us and we walked
over his garden, and house, and the gentlemen
took wine Mrs Davis and I, tea. The children, with
arrived at 1/2 past 6. weary but delighted with the day's
journey. In the eve the children played under the trees
and we sat out until ten o'clock.
