

As this afternoon to see the procession  
I accepted the invitation. all along the  
streets that the procession passed through  
flags (red and white) were floating from poles  
erected for the purpose. The procession was  
just of nearly all the Catholics in Honolulu  
just came a priest with his crucifix  
an open book in his hand from which  
he read as he passed along. Then a  
great number of women each bearing  
a blue flag. They were dressed in white  
brows & then with blue trimmings and  
beautiful flaps of equal length on one  
side on the other blue satin with  
gold trimmings. In the latter part  
in gold. Then a company of women in  
white with red borders. Next which  
was supposed to represent the body of  
Jesus Christ. a coffin covered with  
white and gold veils. in a frame  
supported by four pillars each decorated  
with flowers. The top was covered  
with beautiful feathers and flowers.  
This was placed on a long pole and  
was borne by four Hawaiian boys.  
Then the school children from the Catholic  
schools. Then the Bishop preceded by  
an arcing. beautifully decorated and  
that also was borne by natives. The  
Bishop walked in the centre bearing a  
golden arm. With the school children  
walked the boys dressed in white with  
thick white sails with their hands and  
pages books in their hands. After the  
priest also walked with his cross  
bearing a lot of flowers and palm  
leaves. After the Bishop came the  
Catholic men each bearing flags. Then  
the band. Mrs. Chas. Smith and  
went to Mrs. Hughes where we  
sat a few inches of the procession

They went off the street a long distance  
but we did not follow but went to Mrs.  
Hughes on Colson Street and waited until  
the return when I met Mr. & Mrs. Gottle  
travelling as I expected and went to Mrs.  
we got lunch just in time for lunch  
this eve I have continued working  
a bit on Java Census. As to this day  
Friday 30th this morning went down to Mrs. Chas.  
Smith with Billie and the three men  
carriage took him to school returned  
and after eating breakfast went with  
Mr. Smith to Mrs. Kales room and made  
a long and very pleasant call. This afternoon  
more spent in my room. Working on  
my tick. This is a beautiful home I think  
very much and I will soon try to visit it  
soon.

Sat 1st Another week is just dawning to us clear  
and will soon be number with those  
gone before. I wish that it would not  
have gone so profitably spent. Miss Parrell, the  
housekeeper left today has taken a room  
at the Ladies Home. is expecting friends  
from Cuba by this steamer if they do not  
arrive she will go to Cuba by the first  
steamer. I got the girl from the  
bottom of my heart. alone and almost  
friendless in a land of strangers. She  
feels very lonely. thinks she has not  
been treated well here. She has had a  
hard life of it since she came here I  
hope better days are in store for her.  
Mrs. Kales called today. After dinner Mrs.  
Spalding and Mr. Kales with Billie called at  
Mrs. Smiths and left yesterday returned  
about half past seven. I was glad to  
see them in my room. Working on my tick have  
hardly finished it will finish in another hour  
but I feel too tired to accomplish it.
