Sunday 20th This morn went to Bethel. The service was very interesting each single school class had a part of the Christian armor and the emblems. In class were the Little of South Mrs. Lovers the Daniels with the words Gospel of peace inscribed on them. Mrs. Carter sang the Hymn of Victory. Edith Darnons the Hymn of Salvation. Most Oats class the Power of the Spirit. These good Samaritans are after the offer to Mr Whitman with appropriate verses recited in concert by the class to whom they belonged, the very faithful young Soldier of the cross. Then came the Emblem, I remember Helen Whitney class with the shield of Faith. After the song came, Mrs. Carter class presented the Cross with the word Faith inscribed. Emma Darnons class bore an anchor with the word hope. Mrs. Whitney class the Heart with charity inscribed. The infant class sang Hark the Lillies whisper be. and presented a wreath of Lilies. Mr Whitman delivered a short address and replied appropriately to each class. After singing again the Darnons delivered a short address followed by prayer and singing. All passed off well. and the service was very

beautiful and impressive. This will probably be our last service on shore for a long time. May God watch over us and bring us safely to our destined harbor. Mrs. Cartwright called this afternoon to bid me good bye. This eve we have been to the dedication of the Gym. J. L. Waterhouse has just been getting up he bid forth there this eve. and intends to have a service there very surely and we will be there. Mrs. Black dined with us and went with us this eve. Mr Whitman also called this afternoon.

Sunday 21st Our work today since I last spent my journal, and it has been a very long one to me. for I have been sick the most of the time we left Honolulu on Monday last at one o'clock. We had a nice breeze and at night could see the Island in the dim distance. Capt. Daniel Smith and wife Mrs. Joe Carter, Mr. Whitman, and several others called to bid us good bye. The harbor carrier us to the wharf. The ship bilged yairs half and I was quite seasick for several days. Friday and Sat. was able to do a little jacking away. We have had very disagreeable weather all the week. We have not had a pleasant day. I have been suffering from dizziness and great pain in the stomach and several times think I have taken cold. I have thought many times truly of the Bethel and also of our own Church at home. May God bless and prosper both.
