146. All hands employed in mending fore sail
The cook caught two albatrosses

147. Sunday July 26. Throughout

chase. All hands employed in light breeze from N.E. and S.W. ship heading West by
Long John 135.50

Monday July 27

148. First part calm, middle part light air from Southward latter part moderate breeze from S.W. We ship twice through the night. At daylight Cybele true per compass N. some 30 miles distant. At noon very light air from N.W. standing. Unobserved land. Lat in by Obs 19.28.00

149. Saturday July 28

Thurs 24. hours first part daylight air from N.W. At 3 P.M. a strong squall from N.W. heading S. shore doubled at sails fore and aft pulled mainsail and jib. latter part light winds and calm heading N. towards land with three other sails byrigg. Hana on

150. Sunday July 29

Throughout this day light and a rain breeze trying to get into the harbor of Kila on the N.E. side of Cybele at 9 am took a light breeze from E. and ship is headed in for Harbor

151. Monday March 1852

Commenced with light Easterly breeze at 1 P.M. came to anchor in harbor of Kila with fire, sail, masts, and fuel. A small rigging boat got into the Bay of Kila

Monday March 1852

152. All hands employed in clearing out ship fore and aft to cooper, bread and flour and to send some on shore. Sent eight pipes of bread on tin cases of flour and painted ship's lanterns. Hana the day in Kila Bay

Tuesday March

153. All hands employed in breaking out bread and expounding the same and spinning twine and pork. Put on shore 35 lbs of twine and 6 suitcases and on shore

154. One man on shore in morning after taking deck and pumping till upon which fresh. Hana on shore

Wednesday March

One man on shore employed in getting water from shore. Put on ashore and Hana some part of the morning. Harbor watch on Kila Bay
