

Honolulu March the 9. 1853.

Wednesday. One watch on liberty the other employed in mending the Pilot's gig &c

Thursday March 10. One watch on liberty the other employed in repairing rigging &c

Friday March 11. One watch on liberty the other employed in getting off a reef of water and storing it between decks. We have taken 446 lbs of water 100 lbs of Fresh potatoes. One of the men (Charles Danham) has not returned from his liberty.

Saturday March 12. One watch on liberty and the other employed in mending sails. Fly, jib and main-spar.

Sunday March 13. One watch on liberty and the other on board of ship. The men got put into the fort for getting intoxicated. Took them out Monday at 9 A.M.

Monday March 14. All hands on board engaged in painting Starboard side of ship. At 1 P.M. hove short and hauled out of the harbor. One of the men that was taken out of the fort took a boat and left ship and in the morning the boat was found on the reef without the man.

Tuesday March 15. All hands on board employed in working ship and in getting ready for sea. At sundown all ready for sea.

Honolulu March 16. 1853. Wednesday

All ready for sea at daylight hove short and set a signal for the pilot. By 12 past 9. stood out of the harbor. 12 past ten the pilot left us with strong breeze under double reefed ship. Nine natives and one Portuguese in boat. It was a long off shore.

Thursday March 17. A long off shore in water under double reefed topsails with strong winds from N.E.

Friday March 18. All of these twenty four hours strong N.E. trades a long off shore and on. At night we got drifted some ten miles to leeward. Had ship under close reef and mizen topsails and double reefed main. At 7 made double reefed topsails and courses. Through the night split the jib and it in and by 12 noon sent out a small masted. At noon closed to Diamond Head.

Saturday March 19. On these twenty four hours strong breeze from N.E. At 1 P.M. sent a boat on shore for the Capt and at 4 P.M. he came on board and shaped our course for Ulukou. At 10 A.M. Capt went on shore and sent the boat off with words.
