Friday the 19th

Begins with strong winds from the N.E. ship under top sails & courses steering N.W. & W the watch employed in various jobs of ships duty Middle Part more moderate set the top gallant sails & main rial & flying jib & fore top mast studding sail & the main top gallant studding sail, Latter Part moderate winds from the N.E. the watch emp^l in various jobs of ships duty steering N.W. by N so ends this Day Lat 27° 11' Long 65° 26'

Saturday the 20th

Begins with fresh breezes from the N.E. the watch employed in various jobs of ship duty steering N.W. by N saw a hermaphrodite Bay Middle Part light winds from the E. N.E. & set the fore & main rial & the lower & fore top gallant studding sails steering N.W. by N saw a ship by the wind heading N.E. by E Latter Part light airs from the E. N.E. & the watch employed in various jobs of ship duty steering N.W. by N saw 2 sails one of them a schooner heading to the Northward Lat 28° 44' Long 66° 54'

Sunday the 21st

Begins with light airs & calms the watch employed in ships duty Middle Part strong winds from the N.E. took in the light sail & single reefed the top sails courses N.W. by W Latter Part strong winds changed fore top sail & double reefed the fore & main top sails

Lat 29° 18' Long 68° 24'

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Monday the 22nd

Begins with strong winds from the N.E. ship under double reefed top sails & courses steering N.W. by W one sail in sight Middle Part strong winds turned the reefs out of the top sails & set the top gallant sails Latter Part fresh breezes from the E. N.E. set the main rial & fore top mast studding sail the watch employed in various jobs of ships duty steering N.W. by W Lat 32° 01' Long 69° 33'

Tuesday the 23rd

Begins with fresh breezes from the E. N.E. & the watch employed in various jobs of ships duty steering N.W. by W Middle Part variable winds from the E. actward, Latter Part a fine breeze from the E. S. E. steering N.W. by W all hands employed in changing the sails at 9 o'clock saw 3 sperm Whales going to wind-ward lowered 2 Boats without success at 11 A.M. the Boats returned to the ship made sail & straightened on our course again with a fine gale & fine weather & more pleasant looking paces than there was when we raised the whales so ends this Day
