

1835. Remarks on board Ship. Pilot of New Bedford

Remarks. February.

Plaid Aug 3

Begins with a fresh breeze from N.W. and flying clouds
single rufed Larks j.b. & Sparrows; at night both in j.b. Sparrows
Stone & Minn. Larks, quite moderate through the night, but
daylight the wind turned fresh, at 5 P.M. changed the N. breeze
Strong gales from the Southwest thick driving & heavy weather the
rest of day. Stopped N. till 10 P.M. & lay becalmed N.W. the rest of
the day.

Sat. Oct. 1st '31.

Lat. $41^{\circ} 14' 31''$

Frederick Aug 4

Begin with a strong gale from the S.W. and heavy weather, with the wind light, in the afternoon set the fore sail & jib, & M.M. let the reef out the Main & Main Top sail and set the M. S. gull & sail, the wind backing from S.W. to S.E., latter part a fresh breeze from S.W. and squalls of rain. Steved. P. S. B. when the wind would abate.

Long. 6 hrs 211 A.M. 81° 50'

Lat. Obs. 41° 59.

Thursday 5

Begins with a fresh breeze from the S. S. W. which ceased in the afternoon. To S. cloudy the most of the time and some showers of rain. At night took in the "M. T. yellowbird", Dove & Pigeon Sparrow's and skinned the "M. Sparrow". At 12 M. M. hung ~~up~~ in equally took in the foresail, in the morning took in the main'sail, at the end of the day rather more modest in the foresail.

Sept. 42. 21.

Friday 6

⁴³Begins with a fresh breeze from S by W. and flying clouds
middle much. The same, latter part quite moderate, made a fair
put out the Paint Boat. Employed in various jobs.

Saturday 7

Begins with a moderate breeze from the Northwest and cloudy, mists
the wind shifted to N.W. & cloudy & hazy all the rest of the day.
Sailed N. by B. 11 A.M. N. N. B. 12 M. N. Then over to
the N. L. H. 1, A.M. 1. 11 A, N.W. 12 & then B. L. H. the rest
of the day.

Sunday 8

Begins with a pleasant breeze from the South-west and lasts
middle much the same; at night took in the Fore & Main Top-
sails and two reef in the Main, in the morning fresh breeze
set single reefed Fore & Main Topsails, at 4 P.M. let out all
reef & set the M.C. gallant sail. Steered S. by E. & W. by N.

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Monday 22

begins with a strong breeze from the southward and heavy weather, middle and latter part much the same. Fleeted to the northward till 7 P.M. No. 11. 21. 12. M. B. E. S. 2. till daylight then bore up and ran down between Omaha & the Main, fell in with the River, Mouth of Missouri.

Aug 23

Tuesday

Begins with a fresh breeze from the southward and flying clouds, middle thick & foggy, latter part a thick haze. The first part of the day cruised inside of the Island, at night perceived it coming on thick bore up and run out to the north and hauled too, latter part cruised off to the westward of the Island, in sight the River & Maryland.

Wednesday. 24

Begins with a strong breeze from S.W. and thick hazy weather, and
- all much the same, latter part a fresh breeze and tolerably clear.
The first part lying off and on back of the Island, in the morning
saw up and run round to the north of the Island and hauled her fore-
-sails with the Wh. Manfield, Reine and Maryland. Saw a
brig about 6 P.M. steering to the N.W.

Thursday 25

24. Begins with a fresh breeze from the S.E. and fair weather. Towards the middle the wind became light and thick, here and at 5 P.M. and all night by the north point, from 12 M. to 1 P.M. but by 6 P.M. a light breeze from the north and thick sailing by spells, till forenoon & thick with hummock but got clear again. Saw a barge on fire before wind coming down between the Island and Main Land.

Sunday Aug 26.

Begins with a light breeze from the northward and thick by 10 AM. about 2 P.M. lowered for Humpbacks and got fast to one which ran down between the Island and Main when we cut from him. Under a fresh breeze and thick took in the W. H. Gallatin and double reefed the topsails, latter part the wind backing from N.E. to W. and raining. The Island of Necker bearing about 2 P.M. in 100° 30' and

Saturday

Begins with a strong breeze from the north-west and squalls of rain, middle the wind light and clear, latter part a pleasant breeze from the north and flying clouds. In the afternoon look in the West Coast, a heavy mist coming from the S.W. in the morning put her out again. The Island of Maucha in sight all day when clear bearing south-easterly. Saw a sail in the afternoon, and one in the forenoon.
