

Lahaina. Thursday, May 3d, 1849.

This day has been pleasant, though very warm, I have been very busy packing up my clothes, as we are going to Honolulu tomorrow, where I expect to stop. This evening we have been ashore and spent the evening

Friday, May 4th, 1849.

This day has been pleasant, with a strong breeze we have been ashore, and spent the evening with Mrs. Hale & Cole and Mrs. Bolles. Mr. Talbot came off to stay on board the ship in order to go with us tomorrow.

Honolulu, May 5th, 1849.

We arrived here this morning all well, and Winton & myself came ashore to find me a boarding place. We called at Capt. Mager's and dined, and this afternoon came to board with Mrs. MacFarlen, &c.

Sunday, May 6th, 1849.

This day has been pleasant. Winton & myself went to the Bethel to meeting this morning, and this afternoon he sailed for the Lachar sea. I feel very sad and homesick to have him go and leave me amongst strangers, but I shall try to be contented and happy as possible. Mr. Webster & Capt. Crab took tea here this afternoon. Mrs. Fowler is coming to spend the night with me to night.

Monday, May 7th, 1849.

This day I have felt sad and lonely. Mrs. Henry Howland has spent most of the afternoon with us, and Mrs. Lakin and Mrs. Merrill, has called here this afternoon to see me.

Tuesday, May 8th, 1849.

I have been quite busy today, arranging my trunks and clothing. Two officers from the (English ship) Herald took tea here this afternoon. I have not been out today.

Saturday, May 12th 1849.

The weather has been pleasant since Tuesday. I have called at Capt. Mager's twice, and spent the afternoon at Mrs. Tamm's. This week three ships of War have arrived since Sunday which makes it quite lively here. I am much pleased with Honolulu thus far, and much amused with the natives &c.

Sunday, May 13th 1849.

Tuesday December 3d 1849.

The day passing fair, once more unfurl our sails to a fresh breeze and fair wind, and the good ship Nimrod starts for a sperm whale cruise on the line and elsewhere. It seems like getting home again to be here, although pleased to proceed on the voyage with my husband. I feel sad to part with many very pleasant acquaintances, who I may never see again this side of the eternal world. I shall ever feel interested to hear of Honolulu as I have passed down long months very happily there. It is a very pleasant place, very free and pleasant as you now as they are at home in June, it seems strange to me to see it thus after living where stern winter winds every thing here this in his icy embrace and all looks dreary and desolate as though the earth could not put on her beautiful dress of green again. But enough. May our present cruise be more successful than the last, and we be returned once more to our friends and home in health and prosperity and meet them as we have left at home enjoying the same great blessing.

December 8th 1849.

This has been pleasant with a light wind we have been lying off and on near the Island of Oahu, for the last two days getting nearer, we have got things. Gulls, ducks, chickens, and geese. This afternoon we came near getting ashore on the reef. The wind died away to a calm, and a heavy swell setting in towards the shore, we were only saved from being wrecked by being blown off by the water. I shall be glad to see my friends at home.
