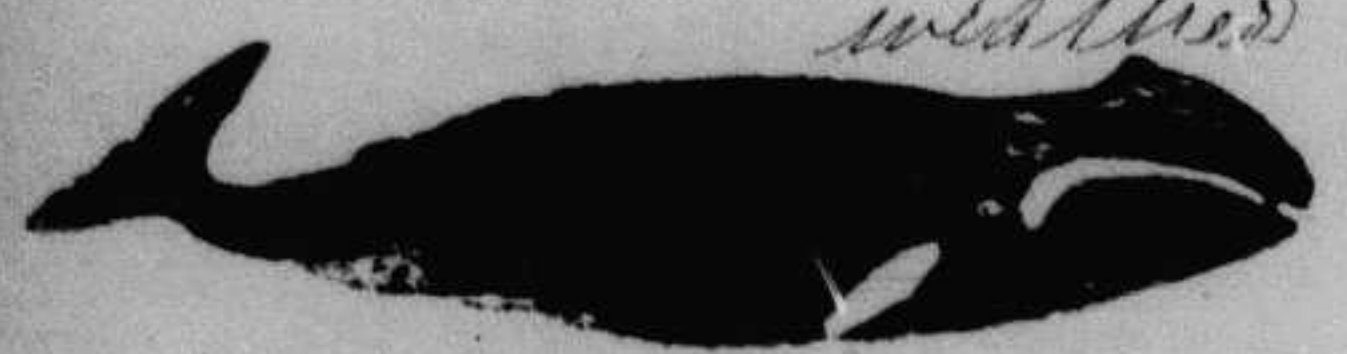


Ship Nimrod In The Arctic Ocean
Saturday July 20th

Commenced with a fresh breeze from the S. & ship in amongst the ice & was in with the land three boats went in shore in hopes to find Whales but sadly disappointed saw 2 or 3 Whales in run of the day got one Boat stove in the act of lowering away. Mid Part was blattered this under double reefed Topsails standing off & on keeping within a proper distance of the Land and by Latter Part fair weather saw a Whale in near the ice & got from end, a cutting in the Whale the Land in sight & abundance of ice



Sunday July 21st

Commenced with a fresh breeze from the S. & fair weather employed in cutting at 4 P.M. finished Mid Part a Boiling ship under double reef. Latter Part thick most of the time all hands variously employed thus ends the Land not far off

Monday July 22nd

Commenced with fresh gales and clear weather ship under a press of sail standing off shore to get out side of the ice Mid Part a Gale of wind ship under blow reefed Main & Mizen Sails Latter Part a fresh breeze & thick weather thus ends employed in boiling

Tuesday July 23rd

Commenced with thick weather & fresh breezes at 10 P.M. finished boiling Mid Part clear weather saw a grater number of Walrusen & Gray Backs. Latter Part rugged weather employed in clearing all thus ends

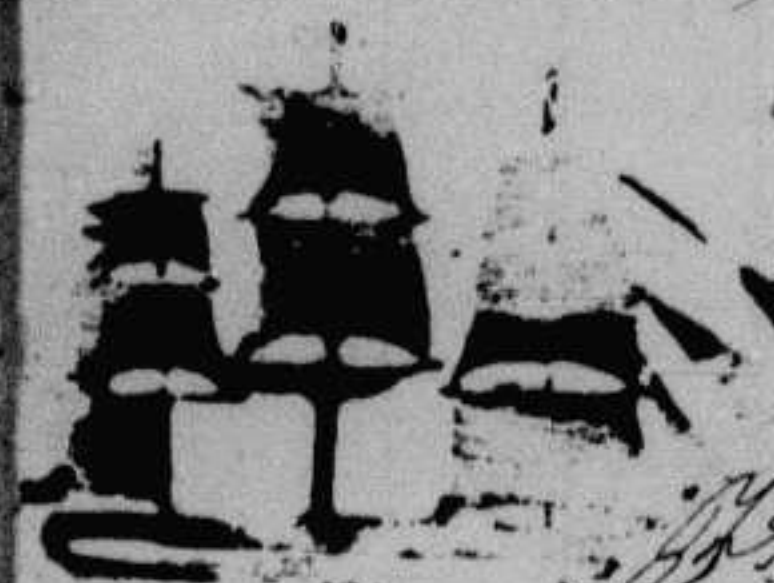
Lat 69° 10' N Long 110° 00' W

Wednesday July 24th

Commenced with fresh gales from the Eastward ship under double reefed Topsails heading in towards the Land at 6 P.M. got up to the Sea with ship off shore & took in Fore & Mizen Sails Mid Part & Latter thick employed in stowing down ends a light air from the S.W.

Thursday July 25th

Commenced with thick weather and a light air from the S.W. employed in stowing down. At 4 P.M. spoke Ship Isaac Hanks of New London Mid Part & Latter thick weather most of the time the watch employed in scraping Bone thus ends no Ob.



Friday July 26th

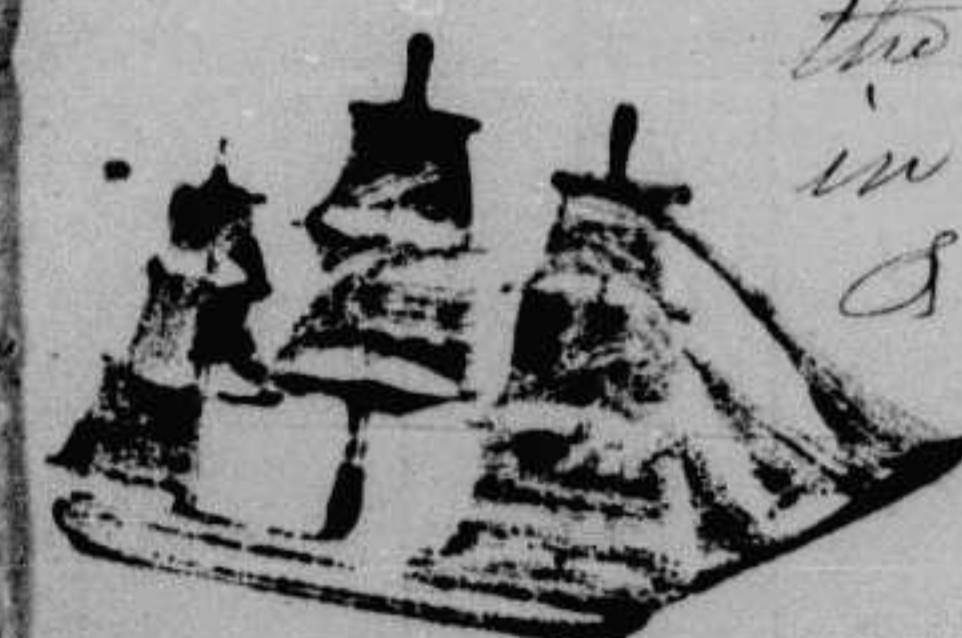
Commenced with a light air & thick weather the Land in sight and the watch employed in scraping Bone & stowing away. Mid Part moderate with a light air from the N. & ship in the wind heading S.W. Latter Part thick stormy weather several ships in sight spoke the Ship Sweating of Sag Harbour thus ends no Ob.

Saturday July 27th

Commenced with a strong breeze & stormy weather ship under double reefed Topsails the wind from the N. 15 ships in sight 2 of them a Boiling Mid Part the weather more settled Latter Part moderate but most of the time thick thus ends the Land not far off

Sunday July 28th

Commenced with a light air from the S. & a hazy kind of weather ship with all sail set ranging in by the wind towards the Land Mid Part fair weather ship sailing in with the Land in hopes to see Whales Latter Part calm & thick weather at 10 P.M. spoke the Cambria of New Bedford thus ends the Land about 15 miles off



Monday July 29th

Commenced with thick weather & a heavy fog at 2 P.M. the fog lighted up at 8 A.M. a Whale lowered over Board for some distance from about 2 hours then let run of him the ice in sight Mid Part a light air then standing in for the Land Latter Part thick stormy weather a fresh breeze from the N. thus ends no Ob.



Tuesday July 30th

Commenced with thick stormy weather a moderate breeze from the Eastward Mid Part the same light & calm Latter Part a breeze from the N. the weather as above thus ends ship heading to the Eastward Lat by account 68° 50' N Long 111° 40' W
