

Sun July 19th. The starboard watch ashore on liberty to day.
 July 20th. Towed our water off to day.
 July 21st. Starboard watch on liberty.
 (Had liberty the rest of the week, and plenty of rain.)
 July 27th. Haul up the fore top gallant mast, and getting ready for sea; the George of Havre, Cooper of New Bedford and Duval of Sag Harbor arrived to day.
 July 28th. The Kufel of Dartmouth arrived to day.
 July 29th. Got underway this morning with a fair wind out of the harbor; spoke in the offing the French ship Argo of Nantes I who this season; five ships in sight one boiling.
 Aug 1st. Running to the S for the Okothk sea.
 Aug 3rd. Spoke the Bremen of Bremen I who this season; raised land at sunset, two of the Kurile Islands.
 Aug 4th. Run through between the two islands into the Okothk sea, (foggy all the week, and very thick)
 Aug 10th. The fog cleared up to day, and we made the land again, and came out in a greater hurry than we went in, the old man having seen enough of the Okothk sea; saw another sail also coming out.
 Aug 11th. Several ships in sight: spoke the Logan of N.B. 7 who this season.
 Aug 12th. Saw the Logan take a whale to day.
 Aug 13th. A strong breeze: lying to all day; land yet in sight.
 Aug 14th. Spoke the Geo Champlin, Sevan of Newport 23 mos out 1400, 8 who this season; the Capt came aboard and also the Doctor, who prescribed for our sick men of which we have 4, 1 white man and 3 Ekanakas.
 Aug 15th. Lowered 3 times to day for whale, once for some which appeared to be sperm whale; a strong breeze this afternoon and took in sail; land in sight.
 Aug 22nd. Spoke the Addison of N.B. boiling; spoke the South Carolina of N.B. 24 mos out 1100; had taken one whale and two dead ones this season; land in sight; lowered in company with the South Carolina.
 Sun Aug 28th. Two sail in sight to day.

Aug 25th. Saw a merchant barque steering to the land; lowered about 5 o'clock and struck a whale which appeared to be sick, and took him alongside about sundown.
 Aug 26th. Cutting to day, finished about noon; in sight of the Kurile Islands; started the tryworks at sundown.
 Aug 27th. Felt the shock of an earthquake this forenoon.
 Lat 49° 35' Lon 157° 35': boiling all day.
 Aug 28th. Finished boiling to day; calm all day.
 Aug 29th. Stowed down to day; spoke the ^(25 mos, 2500, 8 who season) Dartmouth of N.B. this forenoon; the Capt came aboard, and had a tooth extracted; spoke the Margaret Scott of N.B. this afternoon 23 mos 1900, 8 who; the 3 skippers had a game aboard of the Dartmouth.
 Aug 31st. Standing in for the land, hearing by the ships that there were plenty of whales there; saw two dead whales this afternoon, but too much blasted to be good for any thing; took two irons, and a line (part hemp and part manilla) from one; the irons were marked Nantes lost by some French ship.
 Sep 1st. Made the land to day; saw both ships and carcasses: Lat 50° 38'.
 Sep 4th. Saw a number of ships to day; lowered for right whale about 4 o'clock; the boat went on to one, but the boatsteerer misfired; foggy and rainy.
 Sep 5th. Thick fog all day.
 Sep 6th. In sight of land, distant 25 miles; two ships in sight.
 Sep 7th. Off the port of Petropaulski to day; 8 ships in sight; one boiling.
 Sep 8th. Steering to the land to all night with a fair wind; lost sight of land to day, (bound off).
 Sun Sep 13th. Lat 43° 16' Lon 163° 11'.
 Mon Sep 14th. Scrubbed ship to day all over; calm and foggy.
 Sep 16th. Caught 16 skipjacks to day; plenty around the ship; bound to the Southward.
 Sep 19th. Lat 36° 39' Lon 169° 18'.
