

April 1846

Sunday the 12th this day strong double reef
top sail breeze and squally through
the day steering N 30° W with a heavy
sea on so under the way.

Monday the 13th strong breeze double reef
top sail & steering N 1/2° W by N with a
heavy sea on saw nothing through
the day.

Tues the 14th strong breezes from the
N E steering N 1/2° W by W squally and
rough so under the way.

Weds the 15th same as usual steering the
same course prisoners get along
very well so far Lat 15.50 N

Thurs the 16th a strong breeze from the N E
steering N 1/2° W under single reef
top sail and top gallant sail with
some sea on so goes the time.

Frid the 17th saw nothing through the
day steering the same course and
with about the same breeze with
some squalls the rest the same as
usual.

Lat 19.8

Sat the 18th saw nothing through the
day with a strong breeze from
the N E and squally so under
there 4 and 20 hours.

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Sunday the 19th the made the land at
8 A.M. with a strong breeze and some
squally we dropped anchor at 8 P.M.
and then furled the sails &c.

Monday

Thurs the 22nd all hands on board the
Capt delivered the prisoners up to
the Consul placed them and then
lashed them into the boat and
carried them to the fort in boats.

Frid the 23rd started watch on liberty, the
started employed in recruiting and
painting ship so goes.

Weds the 22nd and watch on liberty, &
the other recruiting ship &c.

Thurs the 23rd I sat on shore the other on
board recruiting ship.

Frid the 24th one watch on liberty the
other on duty so goes the time.

Sat the 25th one watch on shore the
other the on duty.

Sun the 26th one watch on shore last
day of liberty. Amers.
