W steering N.E. 3 sail in sight
spoke the ship Globemock of
Falmouth 24 months out 2200 bound
home came with her saw nothing.

Frid the 10th a good breeze from the
S.W. steering N.E. employed
in fitting ship and stowing things
up side down 3 sail in sight.

Sat the 11th a good breeze from the
South steering N.E. by N
employed in fitting ship 1
sail in sight so it goes.

Sunday the 12th strong S.E. trades
steering N.E. by N with
fine weather saw nothing
Lat 21.8 South.

Mon the 13th a strong breeze from
the S.E. steering N.E. employed
in fitting ship saw nothing.

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Thurs the 14th a fine breeze from the S.E.
at 7 A.M. saw the Island of Trinidad
and ran about of it and then
kept her of N.W. employed in
fitting ship saw some fish.

Thurs the 15th a good breeze starting N.W.
employed in fitting the rigging,
saw nothing these 24 hours.

Thurs the 16th light breeze starting
N.W. employed in fitting
the rigging 1 sail in sight.

Frid the 17th a light breeze starting
N.W. employed in fitting the
rigging turned in the main
ship mast rigging saw nothing.

Sat the 18th a light breeze starting N.W.
saw birds employed in fitting
rigging 2 sail in sight.

Sunday the 19th a light breeze
steering N.W. 1 sail in sight
spoke a steam brig from
New York bound to
Rio Lat 17.25 South.
Long 35.12 West.

Mon the 20th a fine breeze from
the S.E. steering N.W. by E employed
in fitting ship 2 sail in sight.
