

Remarks This Cruise on the U.S. Coast New Bedford

July 1879
51 Saturday 13th Com. with light gales from W at 6 P.M. quit cutting it was to much of a sea to think of Bailing the case at 9 P.M. set the watch Midale part Ship still lying by the case Latter part light gales and a heavy swell at 9 A.M. looked on to the case and parted on Clarks Lane and slacken it arose to water for better weather Lat 49° 36' N Long 21° 37' W

52 Sunday 14th Com. with light gales from W the Ship still Vanishing with the case a heavy swell and a fine squall a rain at 4 P.M. exchanged a signal with a Merchant Bt. Midale part the weather some the wind no working to the North Latter part fine weather at 6 A.M. call all hands and looked on to the case keep the Ship off before the Sun at 10 A.M. finish and save about one half of the case wore Ship heading to the Westward Lat 49° 14' N Long 21° 00' W

53 Monday 15th Com. with fine breeze from N and a good position for this place the Ship on the Western tack boiling Midale part the weather fine E. & E. steering W by compass pleasant weather Latter part pleasant wind light from E and no working to the Southward at 9 A.M. a large Steamer pass to the South Westward it is the pleasant day we have here the season and known Whales Lat 49° 38' N Long 23° 28' W

54 Tuesday 16th Com. with fine breeze from the S steering N. W. by N at 2 P.M. passed close to a M. Engr. bound E the watch enpt. case boiling at 6 P.M. look in sail and begin to on the Western tack Midale part fine gales from E and rain cooled down Latter part moderate still raining the wind S.W. at 6 A.M. wore Ship to the S and Eastward at 9 A.M. the fog lifted at 11 A.M. started the no work again Midale some sail a heavy swell from W wore and a thick fog the most of the time and unpleasant weather Lat 49° 38' N Long 23° 09' W

While Cruising In North Atlantic Ocean after Finas Oil

55 Wednesday 16th Com. with light wind from W & W anata thick fog the most of the time and a heavy swell from S.W. the Ship on the Northern tack at boiling head Oil Midale part light gales from N the weather looking colder the Ship on the Eastern tack at 4 A.M. finish Boiling and wore Ship to the Westward Latter part light wind from N and a heavy swell but pleasant the most of the time saw a number of Humpbacks and Merchant vessels Lat 49° 38' N Long 22° 55' W

56 Thursday 17th Com. with light air from N the Ship under easy sail breaking out in the Main Hatch Midale part light wind from S steering N.E. & E and E.S.E. pleasant weather Latter part fresh wind from S the Ship on the S.W. Western tack all hands employed in Stowing down Oil in the Main Hatch saw a number of Merchant vessels and a plenty of Finbacks Humpbacks and square headed Grampuses & Porpoises Lat 49° 22' N

57 Friday 18th Com. with light gales from the South and foggy weather at 5 P.M. finish stowing steering difficult course saw a plenty of Finbacks and Humpbacks Midale part thick fog and a rain wind S.W. the Ship on the North and Western tack under easy sail Latter part fresh wind from West the Ship on the Northern tack fog and rain the watch employed in washing Ship the Ship under easy sail Lat 49° 40' N Long 23° 11' W

58 Saturday 19th Com. with light wind from West the Ship on the Northern tack under easy sail saw a few Merchant vessels Midale part light wind from N steering N.W. thick fog Latter part light gales from W fog and rain the Ship on the Northern tack under easy sail it very unpleasant weather saw a few Porpoises the Chief Mate of duty sick Ernest West of duty with a sore hand the Stewage Boy sick a Seaman sick and there is no place like home Lat 49° 38' N Long 23° 09' W
