

Remarks on the weather in Feb & March 1886

Monday 25 light airs and calms from North and West
water Glass 16° 24° plenty of Ice but the most of
it floating Ice

Thursday 26 light airs and calms plenty of Ice Glass
24° to 32° above zero

Friday 27 light winds from N. N. W. to N. E. and quite
warm the Harbour full of Ice

Saturday 28 calms and light airs from S. W. all of the
kinds leaving and some of the Ice Glass 24° to 38°
the snow and Ice melting fast

March Sunday 1 weather mild passing very fast gales S. W. a few
kinds passing the Light boats gone east and Capt. Horton
and vessel has gone north with a Reeking

March 10 very cold weather Calms from N. N. W.
up to the 23rd Sunday it moderate wind
S. W. the same but light Glass from 6 above
zero to 36 the Harbour froze over down as far
as Seander Misclov Boat shops

Jan 8 strong N. W. wind and cold Glass 11° above at sundown
wind light and a V. snow storm threatening at 11 P. M. in
the night it commenced to snow and blow with
very heavy squalls of hail and wind. I think that
I observed a heavier gale from the North and East
near at midnight the wind shifted to the East and
brown. 28° 9/10

Saturday 9 at daylight the wind shifted to S. W. some rain
and it blowing a heavy Gale from S. W. at East chop
with 36000 bushell of Potatoes on board almost high
and dry Capt. Horton went around to see the Capt.
and make a contract to get her off Glass 13° above

Sunday 10 Calms N. N. W. clear and cold 3 S. W. a shore up to the J.
cove but no particulars Glass 13° above have had
no boat since Thursday Fannie & Albert came down and stop
a few hours

Monday 11 Calms from N. W. clear and cold Glass 7° above Murry Horton
Hira & Anchor a good many Anchors lost and a number
of vessels arrived in shore in different places and a good
many lives lost and a number of vessels not heard from

Tuesday 12 clear and cold wind N. W. Glass at zero
fair 5° above Capt. Horton sold a Anchor a number
of vessels came in and all report bad storm

Wednesday 13 strong winds N. W. clear and cold some Ice
around Glass zero in the morning sundown 14°
above and light winds N. and pleasant

Thursday 14 light winds from N. N. E. Glass 14° above some
Ice around still hear of Ship necks at sundown
Glass 24° above at 5 P. M. Capt. Horton went to a Scho.
ashore and got a job

Friday 15 light winds from North and East warm beautiful
weather Glass from 32° to 38° above no tidings
from the two Pilots as yet

Saturday 16 light winds from West fine beautiful weather
Capt. Hiram Luce came on the boat to day Capt. Horton
got more Anchor of N. W. E. and he & weather
went up this evening to hear the Bog Bingham some
rain and quite warm the snow going fast

Sunday 17 some fog the first part of the day at 11 A. M. wind S. W.
the vessels made a start for Boston

Monday 18 fine weather wind N. W. and S. W. light Glass 24° to 34°
manly Smith came to day reports a hard time Capt. Horton
Morning Potatoes from one vessel to the other in the night
a light flurry of snow

Tuesday 19 light winds E. N. E. to S. E. cloudy weather Glass 39° to
killed 39° at 1 P. M. came in rain at sundown wind S. W.
the fog cleared off the snow going fast in the night rain and fog

Wednesday 20 fine winter weather Glass 39° above rain N. W.
to N. N. W. clear weather Hiram got a Pilot burnt

Thursday 21 light winds N. E. and E. S. E. Peter started for Boston
by land this morning Glass 30° and 42° above at sun-
down came in fog and rain

Friday 22 light winds and mild weather winds N. W. to
N. N. W. a few vessels moving

Saturday 23 light winds N. N. W. to S. W. a few vessels started for
Boston Capt. Horton went to a vessel ashore and layed
by him most all day at night made a contract to get
him off for 600 three and a dollars

Sunday 24 light winds N. N. E. at 10 A. M. came in a snow storm
Capt. Horton and the boys a reeking
