

Sun. Aurora, Cruising.

Saturday, July, 28th, 1888.

Begins with calm and light air from west all ways, lying to under small sail, employed butaking out for provisions, middle part calm last part light air from S. East steering full and by on the Port tack. at 9 A.M. saw two vessels to windward whaling lowered two boats and pulled up there and chased in company with Brig. V. H. Hill, & Schooner Point without success whales gallied and going to S. West. very quick.

Sunday, July, 29th.

Begins with light breeze from the Eastward boats chasing whales and returned at 3 P.M. without success boats from V. H. Hill gallied whales early in the morning. at 4.30 P.M. spoke V. H. Hill, three mounds out 70 fathoms, Spinn. middle and last part wind and weather much the same steering full and by on different tacks, three sails in sight

Monday, July, 30th.

Begins with moderate breeze from the Eastward steering full and by on the Port tack, middle and last calm and light air from most all ways lying to under short sail watch variously employed in ships duty. one sail in sight.

Tuesday, July, 31st, 1888.

Begins with light from S. West steering full and by on the Starboard tack at 5.31 P.M. saw a large sperm whale lowered two boats Starboard boat went on struck the whale with both iron but neither one went in hauled stern in both toggled and brought up. returning at dark without success middle part squally lying to on different tacks last part squally with light air from all ways at 6 A.M. saw three large whales lowered and got one to the Se. Boat

Wednesday Aug. 1st, 1888.

Begins with light air from the East employed cutting spoke Brig D. A. Small. chasing whales last part calm and light air from most all ways employed cutting

Thursday Aug 2nd

Begins with calm finished the body and started byworks at 3 P.M. spoke B. K. Ware, middle and last part calm employed boiling and cutting in the head.
