

Thursday Feb. 18th 1869
Comes in with strong breezes from the
W and W.S.W. and hazy weather
with rain. crew employed in various duties
about ship. George Sankhuff
the Steward was discharged from the ship
articles by the Shipping Master there
being a complete forfeiture of all wages
on account of embezzlement of tobacco and
also of desertion. He the said Steward
being absent from the ship more than
the 48 hours previous to his discharge.
The Cook also was discharged by
the Shipping Master as per agreement
paying him in full for all wages due
him as per customary mode of settling
at this port. Full amount due
said Charles Delano after all expen-
ses and charges paid on his account and his
indebtedness to the ship and Owners being
only \$6.32 etc.
Paid said Charles Delano per
order of Huber Delano \$25.00
No report yet from the 5 deserters

Friday Feb. 19th 1869
Comes in with light air from the S.W.
and S. with fine weather. crew em-
ployed in various duties about ship - such
as filling, taking on board, and stowing
water - taking on board chains for ballast
etc. making preparations for sea.
5 men went on board from the
shore with the view of shipping
have heard nothing from either the
Steward or the five deserters. - The
Mate attending duty for the first
time since Feb. 8th.

Saturday Feb. 20th 1869
Comes in with strong breezes from
S.W. and S. with hazy weather
crew employed in stowing water - ballast
and doing other duties on board ship.
Shipped five men today their
names as follows Bernar ^{adv. \$3} Cline, ^{adv. \$3} Fere,
John ^{adv. \$3} Goncalves, ^{adv. \$3} Caesar ^{a drafted \$3} Martez,
Gouquin ^{adv. \$3} Rodrigue and Joas Francisco ^{adv. \$3}
all to be on board Monday morning by
9 o'clock. No report from the
five deserters. Through the request
of the Shipping Master, and the
consent of the Steward I delivered
him his clothes. Men shipped to
be on board Monday morn at 6.
