

Ship Omega In the North Atlantic Ocean Feb 1847

Remarks Sunday 14th 1847

First part of this 24 hours calm and any quantity of rain at 4 P.M. lowered our boats for exercise and to change the scene

Middle part light baffling winds and some rain black fog all round the ship all night

Latter part fine gentle breeze from the East course sent all sail set

Lat 33° 13' Long 18° 45' West

Remarks Monday 15th 1847

First part of this 24 hours gentle breeze fine pleasant weather course South at

Middle part light baffling winds and pleasant weather at daylight saw two sails one a Bark the other a Schooner both steering to the South at 10 A.M. our Capt. ordered to board the Bark

Latter part fine pleasant weather little or no wind and our Capt. has not yet returned employed in sheathing the decks

Lat 31° 47' Long 21° 30' West

Remarks Tuesday 16th

First part of from the East from the Bark ship called the last from Cadiz to Rioleganaro

Middle part rain fell

Latter part Course South and stuff

Steering towards Cape Good Hope March 1847

Remarks Friday 19th 1847

First part of this 24 hours strong breeze from North West Course East all sail set at 3 P.M. drenched reefed the top sails for a squall more rain than wind at 5 P.M. shook the reefs out the Main top sail and set the till at 7 P.M. a heavy squall struck in the till parted the Main Course and drenched reefed the top sails

Middle part heavy squally and a heavy sea at daylight calm employed in heaving out the main hold for water and bread employed blacksmithing and other jobs the Carpenter went very sick indeed and faint fast

Lat 35° 57' Long 31° 50' West

Remarks Saturday 20th 1847

Commenced with light breeze from the Westward and a thick fog Course East all sail set saw a number of Whales the Capt. shot one lowered a boat back him to the ship

Middle part gentle breeze from the Westward Course East of South the Carpenter went sick requires watches

Latter part light baffling winds employed variously

S. Course

Lat 35° 47' Long 16° 06' West

Remarks Sunday 21st 1847

Commenced with light baffling winds from the North steering by heading East at sunset wind inclining more to the East fell off South by West at 10 P.M. Lacked ship heading E. Course at 3 A.M. more ship heading S. by E.

The Carpenter went very sick indeed in the Cabin do not think he is long for this world feel sure to make Trip to the Cape to put him ashore

Latter part moderate breeze steering sharp by heading South East of South all sail set saw a number of Whales employed in heaving the Labok

Lat 37° South Long 15° 35' West
