

Ship Omega Bound to the South Cape of New Zealand

September Remarks Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> 1847

fore part of these 24 hours, both hours from the South Course South of East all sail set. Saw one sperm whale at sunset took in light sails Course the same employed getting up water

Middle part Strong breeze from the South Course South at daylight thick heavy weather accompanied with rain

After part Strong breeze and very squally Saw a school of porpoises

Lat 38° 15' South  
Long 166° 55' East

Remarks Monday the 13<sup>th</sup> 1847

fore part of these 24 hours Strong breeze from the South East at 4 P.M. wind shifted to the South West took in all sail saw a sperm whale took in light sails and were ship heading West half circle

Middle part wind shifted to the South East at daylight set double reef of main and mizzen

After part a heavy sea running wind shifted to the South and blowing in close reefed the main top sail Saw a school of whales

Remarks Tuesday the 14<sup>th</sup> 1847

fore part of these 24 hours blowing a gale from the South and West we lay to under a close reef main top sail heading to the Westward at 4 P.M. killed a hog

Middle part the same an awful sea running

After part the same turned up the Starboard boat

Lat 38° 00' South  
Long 165° 35' East

Moving towards the South Cape of New Zealand Sep 11 1847

September Remarks Wednesday the 15<sup>th</sup> 1847

fore part of these 24 hours blowing a gale from the South West we lay to under a close reef main top sail a heavy sea running and hail squalls occasionally

Middle part same moderate wind the same at daylight part the sea set on the main and set double reef top sail and courses and set

After part wind and sea much the same employed in setting up some of Mr. Cook's cargo of rearing crew courses fore and aft

Lat 37° 27' South  
Long 164° 14' East

Remarks Thursday the 16<sup>th</sup> 1847

fore part of these 24 hours Strong breeze from the South West we made double reef heading West South West at sunset shortened sail for the night

Middle part moderate wind the same

After part made all sail heading South West by West-south West in light saw some birds employed in carrying up some of the cargo of rearing crew

Remarks Friday the 17<sup>th</sup> 1847

fore part of these 24 hours moderate breeze from the South we steering by heading South West under all sail at sunset shortened sail for the night

Middle part light air from the South West all sail heading South West part light air and calm employed putting on some of the cargo of rearing crew of the Captain's luggage to Cook's thick cloudy weather in the

Lat 38° 10' South  
Long 163° 00' East
