

Sunday the 25th 1848

first part of these 24 hours, brisk breeze from S.W. by E. all sail out at 4 PM spoke ship Alpha 21 miles 830 Middle part - brisk breeze latter part do

Monday the 26th 1848

first part of these 24 hours brisk breeze from the Northward steering by heading East the Alpha off the sea bow Middle part much the same same heading up East & East
29.30
161.03 latter part light air off East again embayed seriously S. Ends

Tuesday the 27th 1848

first part of these 24 hours light air from the East heading East by South at sunset off S. East - spoke ship heading S.W. by West Middle part 29.13 and 161.03 spoke ship again to the South East latter part 161.07 Squally and a bit Sea heading S. East

Wednesday the 28th

first part of these 24 hours strong breeze from the Northward we steering by heading S. East all prudent sail out Middle part strong breeze all inclining westerly double reefed fore and aft. 29.05 and 165.33 at daylight commenced raining and continued until noon when it cleared away and gentle breeze from S. East

Thursday the 29th 1848

first part of these 24 hours moderate breeze from South West bearing S. East all sail out saw a ship to the Eastward spoke her the Alpha Middle part light air latter part brisk breeze from South East all sail out course S. East by S. 28.28
163.57 sent the May to Gallant mast aloft

Friday the 30th 1848

first part - brisk breeze all sail out Course S. East by Middle part light air
28.33 at daylight brisk breeze the Alpha in Light off the Starboard beam at noon saw a sail ahead coming up fast - winds getting light S. East

Saturday the 31st

commenced with light air from the Eastward all sail out heading S. East at 4 PM saw boats in the water from the Alpha lowered 4 boats to ascertain the cause but found nothing took up the boats and stood on
latter 26.07 our course Middle part light air
long 161.06 latter part do two ships in sight

Sunday the 30th

first part of these 24 hours light air from the South Course S. East by South in company with the Alpha and Harragansett of Beantucket Middle part the same
25.20
161.27 latter part light baffling winds at noon calm calm

MAY the 1 1848

first part of these 24 hours light air and calm Course S. East 2 ships in sight
Middle part Squally with a bit breeze heading S. East
24.15 latter part much the same S. East
161.09 nothing in sight or even expect there will be

Tuesday the 2nd

first part of these 24 hours, brisk breeze from the Eastward and Squally weather 2 ships in sight we all steering by heading S. East Middle part strong breeze and latter part do the Alpha in our wake 2 miles astern

Wednesday the 3rd 1848

first part of these 24 hours strong breeze from the Eastward all sail out heading S. East at 2 PM 23.16 spoke the Alpha at 7 PM spoke the Harragansett 159.30 and steered away S. East for Rarotonga Middle part shortened sail and helped by the wind to the S. East at daylight saw Rarotonga bearing west steered away for the landing on the S. East side of the Island at 10 hauled aback and the Capt went on shore to trade at 11 sent a raft of Cask on shore for water S. East 2 ships in sight steering for the landing the Alpha and Harragansett S. East
