

# Ship Omega Laying at Hobartown

Sunday the 3<sup>d</sup> 1845

First part gentle breeze from the S.W. and calm in the  
an breeze at 1 P.M. Ship Alexander Coffin got underway and stood to  
Sea put on board Charles Huddy on board and sent her to the  
Middle part fine  
Latter part light air from the East several arrivals from  
the Colonial ports to Ende.

Monday the 4<sup>th</sup>

First part of the 24 hours light air and calm  
with some rain at 2 P.M. the English Ship Commodore  
Capt Goldsmith arrived 100 days from London  
Middle part calm  
Latter part wind S.W. and squally disagreeable rainy weather  
continued they had taken 1 of our runaways and put them on the land  
mill for safe keeping to Ende.

Tuesday the 5<sup>th</sup>

First part of the 24 hours strong gale from the S.W.  
employed cutting the waterways around the house  
Middle part blowing strong a great quantity of rain fell  
through the night Latter part much the same  
employed in ship duty

Wednesday the 6<sup>th</sup>

First part wind from S.W. and very squally  
Middle part the same latter part fine employed  
personally took a raft of water on board  
emp.

Thursday the 7<sup>th</sup>

First part moderate employed getting sails  
Middle part blowing heavy latter part moderate  
employed taking on board bread and repairing  
sails

Friday the 8<sup>th</sup>

First part of the 24 hours moderate wind  
continuing Middle part calm  
Latter part gentle breeze took on shore 4 tons of  
Sperm Oil employed talking around the store  
repairing old sails and getting the ship ready for sea

# Laying at Anchor at Hobartown

Saturday the 9<sup>th</sup>

First part of the 24 hours strong breeze and squally  
weather cannot do anything Middle part the same  
latter part thick weather and blowing heavy  
about the foretop sail and lost another this morning  
found one of our men missing a Spaniard name Mayman  
afterwards turned he was in the boat house for safe keeping

Sunday the 10<sup>th</sup>

First part of the 24 hours strong breeze from the  
Westward and very squally  
Middle part which the same latter part also  
saw by the telegraph that an American whale was in  
sight to Ende

Monday the 11<sup>th</sup>

First part of the 24 hours strong breeze from the S.W.  
black and cold at 3 P.M. the ship Master of Mysie  
came in and anchored 7 months from home 300  
barrels the Capt Sick Middle and latter part  
weather much the same employed taking on board  
provisions and other necessities to Ende

Tuesday the 12<sup>th</sup>

Commenced with light air and pleasant weather  
the first we have had this 10 days employed getting  
things on board and getting ready for sea  
Middle part calm  
Latter part strong sea breeze and very squally

Wednesday the 13<sup>th</sup> 1845

First part blowing strong up the bay  
Several arrivals  
Middle part the same  
Latter do all ready for sea cannot get out

Thursday the 14<sup>th</sup>

First part strong sea breeze cannot get out but 3  
of our ship company on board who has been boarding in the trial mill also  
took on board 6 men that we shipped here (Hobartown runaways) James Bruce  
Lachlan Hocking Rice all their runaways) discharged C. E. Huddy Cooper  
Middle part calm latter part do do Ende
