

Sunday Dec 1 1864

all these 24 hours calm and pleasant
Weather Lat 44° 41' S Long 63° 30' W
all well by No Whales

Friday Dec 6 1864 at this date have squally
bad weather employed hauling a
humpback. We caught on the 24
saw several other whales yesterday and
and to day boys chasing could get
near them

Lat 30° 40' South
Long 68° 10' W
Land distant 23 miles

Monday Dec 9 1864 strong gale from S.W. with
rain ship under storm sails heading
to the S.E.

Lat 37° 20' S
Long 68° 30' W

Tuesday Dec 11 1864

Pleasant weather ship off Magellan Straits
No Whales saw a steamer go on to the
strait

Lat 53° 42' S
Long 68° 08' W

Thursday 13 Dec

all these 24 hours light baffling wind
ship steering to the S.E. bent at New Municipality

Lat 58° 12' S
Long 68° 01' W

Sunday Dec 13 1864

all these 24 hours strong gales from S.W.
with rain ship heading to the S.E. under
storm sail at 8 A.M. Mr Perry fourth
officer fell from the jibbe boom and was
killed done all ~~the~~ ~~the~~ We could to save
him he was a native of the Western
Islands

We also suppose the ship to
be 30 miles to the S.E. of Staten Land

Monday Dec 23 1864

blowing a gale from W.N.W. have had nothing
but westerly gales for the past 10 days and
all from the Westward the 18 one of my men
by the name of Hunt fell from the main yard
and broke his thigh but at the best I could
at this date he is doing well

Lat 33° 40' S
Long 69° 20' W

Tuesday Dec 24 1864

all these 24 hours strong gale from the
Westward ship heading to the Southward under
storm sail a ship in sight

Lat 58° 40' South
Long 70° 35' W

Wednesday Dec 25 1864 Christmas

for part of these 24 hours strong westerly
winds later part strong S.E. wind with
rain and snow steering from W to S.W.

We also suppose Lat 58° 30' S
Long 72° 01' W
