

Tuesday June 2 1868

all these 24 hours pleasant weather ship fast in the ice during all I can get her out ship in sight to the southward sailing

Lat 64 14

Long 176 32 W

Wednesday June 3 1868

then 24 strong gale from east ship fast in heavy ice several sail in sight

20 lines

Thursday June 4 1868

first part heavy gale from east ship fast in heavy ice at 1 A.M. saw some swell from south at 3 A.M. heavy swell ship pounding heavy set double reefed topsails heading to the southward at 11 A.M. got out of the ice damaged the Rudder and other damages

I felt very thankful to get her clear water once more

Sunday June 7 1868

for the past 3 days a gale from east with thick stormy weather some ships about seven ships have taken whales to this I was fast in the ice all the north side in sight

1868

Monday June 9 1868

first part foggy ship in light ice later part clear with westerly wind steering to the eastward for Cape bearing at 8 P.M. have to off Cape heading

20 sail in sight

Tuesday June 10 1868

all these 24 hours pleasant weather ship close in to Cape Agden saw 37 sail N.W. Whales at 3 P.M. started to the S.W. with light easterly wind and thick fog and scattering ice

Wednesday June 11 1868

all these 24 hours light wind and thick fog ship in the straits among scattering ice the 1st spoke ship Josephine S. Whales and Hudson ship Count Bismark 1 Whales

rather a dark line to the

Thursday June 12 1868

most of these 24 hours strong westerly wind ship near the West shore at noon

20 sail in sight
