

Remarks on board Bark Awashonks. Capt Marble
 Sunday December 9th 1860
 Middle part fresh gale latter part strong breeze. at 6 AM set
 a double reefed topsails. steering East by compass to 26.0
 Long 115.00

Monday December 10th 1860
 these twentyfour hours commenced with a strong breeze from
 NNE. Bark under double reefed topsails. steering East by compass
 at 7 PM shortened st sail and left to the wind heading NNE
 at 8 PM made sail steering to the S. E. middle and latter
 part light breeze. all sail set. Lat 35.40 S
 Long 115.00 W

Tuesday December 11th 1860
 this day commenced with a light breeze from S. E. all sail
 set steering to the Southward & Eastward. plenty of Finbacks
 in sight but not a sign of a Right Whale to be seen,
 and not so much as a sail. at night shortened sail begin
 to grow somewhat discouraged. in not having caught a whale.
 Three months out clean. middle and latter part much like the
 fore part so ends latter part strong breeze Lat 35.50 S
 Long 114.00 W

Wednesday December 12th 1860
 commenced with a strong breeze all sail set steering S. E.
 wind about NNE. at 6 PM broke out a cask of bread
 at sundown shortened sail and luffed to the wind. at
 daylight set mainlogaland sail. steering S. E. from
 middle and latter part much like the fore
 Lat 36.00 S
 Long 113.00 W

Thursday December 13th 1860
 commenced with a strong breeze from the
 NNE. steering S. E. with mainlogaland
 at sundown shortened st sail runs
 running during the night with double
 reefed topsails. standing whole upteter.
 middle and latter part much like the fore
 part strong breeze and thick. at 7 PM broke out
 water out of the main hatch Lat 36.00 S
 Lat 36.00 S

Friday December 14th 1860
 these twentyfour hours commenced with a fresh breeze
 from about S. E. Bark heading to the Eastward at 1.30 PM
 lowered after black fish chased them about 1 1/2 hours and
 then came aboard at trailing & thick fog. at 4.15 PM raised
 a large Frenchman on the wind under short sail. at 4.50
 raised a back three points on the weather bow at 7.30
 spoke and gained with the Bark Falcon Capt Bradley
 (lat Napier) 200 sperm 14 months out. had seen for
 three whales on this ground this season and they swing
 quick to the windward. saw them about East South East
 from here one week ago. The letter which I find for
 Edward H. Hoyle I send on board of this Bark as she
 expected to see the India. and as I have given up the
 last chance of seeing her as we are bound up of the ground
 latter part wind about S. E. Bark on the star board tacks
 so ends these twentyfour hours Lat 36.00 S
 Long 115.00 W

Saturday 15th 1860
 commenced with a strong breeze Bark under
 whole topsail courses & jib. wind about S. E. the
 Bark heading about NNE. middle and latter part
 moderate breeze. so ends Lat 36.25 S
 Long 115.00 W

Sunday December 16th 1860
 this day commenced with a logaland trade breeze
 from the Southward and Eastward Bark heading
 to the NNE. at 10 PM rigged a Ransom rope
 middle and latter part fresh breeze at 10 PM tacked
 ship and stood to the S. E. at 11 took in the
 S. E. sail. one sail in sight. Lat 36.00 S
 Long 115.00 W

Monday December 17th 1860
 commenced with a fresh breeze from S. E.
 Mainlogaland set ship heading S. E. and S. E. S
 middle part squally took in some of the
 light sails. latter part moderate. so ends this day
 Lat 36.00 S
 Long 115.00 W
