

Western ground
Remarks on board Thursday February 23^d 1832
First part fair weather with fine breeze employed
eyed stowing oil. Latter part fresh trade. Lat 12
No. saw sperm whales to the windward, Lat 12.30

Friday February 24th
At 12 noon the weather was fair and the wind
to two whales and got them. two more went to
the windward a spouting thick blood. chased
them for a long time but could not overtake
them. At 5 p.m. got the whales along side. Latter
part strong trades cut in the whales and began
to boil. Latitude 34 miles S. Long. by Dr. 123.30 W.

Saturday February 25th
First part employed stowing down oil. with
fair with fresh trades. Latter part at 7 A.M. fine
shed boiling. Lat 56 miles S. Long. by Dr. 123.24 W.

Sunday February 26th
All these 24 hours fair weather with brisk trades. Nothing
to be seen. It appears as tho every thing had left the ground.
Latitude by Dr. 1.05 S. Longitude by Dr. 123.20 W.

Monday February 27th
Still fresh trades. on the latter part employed
stowing down oil and hoisting up and cooping
some of the between deck oil. Lat 14 miles S. Long. 123.20

Tuesday February 28th
Pleasant weather. At 2 p.m. saw a ship off the bow
steered off for her. At 4 finished stowing down
At 5 p.m. spoke ship Augustus of A. Bedford. Capt
Lawrence. 18 months out with 1150 bbls. Swenson
board of her and pass the evening. Latter part
moderate pleasant weather steering to the South
find the tide setting strong to the North.
Latitude by Dr. 27 miles S. Long. by Dr. 123.40

Wednesday February 29th
Moderate pleasant weather nothing in sight
At 5 p.m. Capt Lawrence came on board and
pass the evening. Middle part carried all sail
headed to the South. Latter part fine trades
wiping all sail steering by the wind to the
South see porpoises.

Latitude by Dr. 1.18 South
Longitude by Dr. 124.40 W.

Remarks on board Thursday March 1st 1832
All these 24 hours fair weather with fine cruising
breezes saw jumpers and porpoises.
Latitude by Dr. 1.44 S. Long. by Dr. 124.35 W.

Friday March 2nd
First part fair trades heading to the N.E. At
3 p.m. saw a strange sail on our weather beam
steering to the North. Latter part steered to the
South saw a great many porpoises. Lat 1.05 S. Long.

Saturday March 3rd
First & middle part fair weather with fresh
trades steering to the North. Latter part
fresh trades and squally. Lat 1.18 Long.

Sunday March 4th
First part fresh trades and squally.
Middle part took in all sail and have
too. Latter part fine weather. At 10 A.M. saw
a large whale off the bow. At 1 p.m. part 11 he
came up close to the ship, lowered and
made fast. she went down and took the
line. no boat near enough to bind on. Lat 1.18

Monday March 5th
At 2 p.m. the whale came up but no boat
near enough to get on. the second raising
which made it 2 o'clock. went on made
fast and got her. At 4 p.m. got her along
got dinner and began to cut. At 7 in the
evening made fast for the night.
Latter part at sunrise saw whales close
to the ship lowered and chased, but could
not catch them. At 9 returned and
cut in the body of the large whale. got
dinner and lowered again for whales three
miles off the weather beam. Lat 49 miles S. Long.

Tuesday March 6th
At 2 p.m. made fast to one small one and
got her. At 5 p.m. took her along side. began
to boil. Latter part cut in the large
whale head. Latitude 50 miles S. Long. 125.28 W.
Wednesday March 7th
First part cut in the small whales. Latter
part at 3 finished boiling body and began
to boil head. Latitude 50 miles S. Long. 125.30 W.
