

Monday 19th of June 1841.
Strong breeze at sea raised the Island of
Rodrique, on the weather beam wore ship at
sundown ends this day.

Tuesday 20th of June.
Strong South East trade came up to the Island
this afternoon morning arrived in about
two this afternoon for water the ship of
White Jacket from Bombay bound to London
cut out the reefs in pieces all hands saved
getting casks ready for water, so ends this
day.

Wednesday 21st of June.
Sent a raft on shore ^{this morning} set up fore-shrouds
and rove new lanyards and run the water boys
came on board tonight from shore had
good time so ends this day.

Thursday 22nd June.
Sent in a raft for water today and get
it off went on shore with Captain Caber
and did not understand the orders, so ends
this day.

Friday 23rd June
Water off today, the Brig came in
today, so ends today.

Saturday 24th of June 1841.
Very cloudy weather, boat went ashore, sent off a
sail came from the ship White Jacket, to old
man on shore, so ends this day.

Sunday 25th of June
Light rain today sent a mainsail on board
bought ashore and maintopsail, so ends this day.

Monday 26th of June.
Hove up chain today, but did not go Captain
went ashore spars selling cheap foreyard four
dollars got three spars from ship White Jacket
but ashore all day, so ends Monday.

Tuesday 27th of June.
Under way this morning, to go out sea strong
breeze one reefed topsails, painted the boats at
four this afternoon, parted foretopsail sheet,
so ends this day.

Wednesday 28th of June.
Heavy squalls carrying sail quite hard, at noon
took in the Gib and Spantler and stood along
untill 4 P.M. took in mainsail and now very
heavy sea so ends today.

Thursday 29th June.
Fine weather, all sail out steering South by West,
overhauling sails, quite cold so ends this day.

Friday 30th June.
Right wind mending sail at noon, wind all
gone, rove foretopsail sheets, very warm,
painted the Row Boat so ends this day.

Saturday 1st of July.
Light wind, at daylight tacked ship, mending
sail one timber in sight so ends this day.
